




back of the Germans on a wide front To the north of La Bassee the Brit-ish are doing little more than holding their own, but at the same time they are keeping great masses of Germans engaged, troops who otherwise would be available against the French offensive.

In the eastern field the Germanic forces in Galicia, who are said to num-, ber 1,500,000 men, are reported to be within twenty miles of Przemysl. The Russians would appear to be developing counter strokes both on the west Galician front and in Bukogina and they claim initial successes, but military men here are careful of committing themselves on the outcome of these activities pending further de-

velopments. The hint made by Lord Haldane of the possibility of conscription has been interpreted in some quarters as meaning there is now less confidence that the war will be over

by fall and that the authorities are making all their dispositions in case another winter campaign is necessary. The resignation of the Italian cabinet has nonpulsed the general public, but well informed political observers




