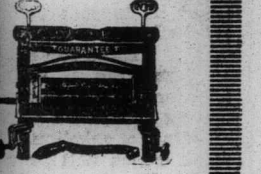
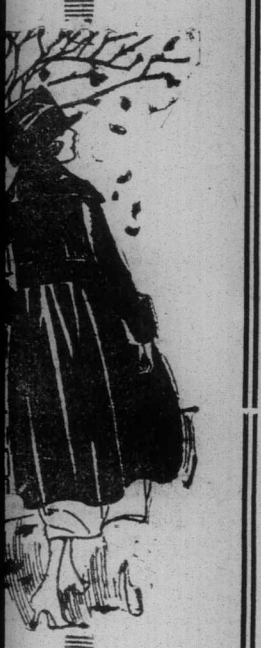

CRIPPLED SOLDIERS' DANCE; NEW CURE IS ADOPTED

Novel Methods of Treatment at Hart House, Toronto, Attracting International Interest - Work Has Been so Successful That it Will be Carried Into Other Hospitals of Commission

Toronto, Sept. 11.—The man who associates with the stilling air of disinfectants and the pills finds Hart House, the centre of the Military Hospitals Commission's work of functional re-education for disabled soldiers in Toronto, a revelation which upsets all his notions of curative measures.

The place is filled with activity, hope and fellowship, and the apathy of men fast growing used to the notion of being crippled melts like April's charge, and the miracle working methods which they are employing to restore men to their normal condition.

Fantastic as the idea may appear, the crippled soldiers are dancing, playing volley ball, and other active gym games under instruction, as part of their treatment, and great results are being realized.

Mental Attitude Vital

The men detailed to Hart House for treatment are those who through injuries have lost control of certain nerves or muscles. They may be unable to control a hand, a foot, or leg, or a bullet in the brain may have destroyed a motor area. Still other cases are those where injury or shock has affected some mental process, such as memory, concentration or association.

All the conditions following these injuries have their psychological as well as physical aspect, and a man's mental attitude toward his condition is shown to be vital.

"I can't" must be eradicated to start with," explained one of the instructors, "and to foster a self-reliance, we play games in which a whole class of men with various disabilities are engaged. This induces the men in the excitement of the moment to perform the natural action, which if more time were allowed for thought, they would believe beyond their powers."

The games afford the boys a great deal of enjoyment and the period allotted to them is all too short. The boys' dancing classes, they demand funny figures they cut, when a refractory muscle causes them to do the unexpected, are regarded as only another occasion for laughter.

"They play more like 'white horses' than invalids, in spite of the fact that they may be dragging a foot after them. The foot in a few weeks' time will in all probability be giving perfect service again."

The dancing is Swedish, not the society brand, but still demanding grace. The music is the choice of the returned men, and many of the selections come from the musical shows which ran on Broadway while they were wired in the trenches of Flanders.

Strong on Synchronization

These tuneful ditties percolated even to the front lines and when it was put up to the boys to choose records for the gramophone used for their training classes, they demanded Irving Berlin's best, and many a back tending to curvature has been restored to its normal straightness by the rhythmic music of a ragtime music which wouldn't let a fellow stop.

Scientific Theories Underlying

Casual as it may seem, the dancing is all carefully planned to meet the needs of the group engaged in it, by the returned men, who are the assistants of every man under their care, and the particular movements which must be persisted in to restore him to his normal state. Patient consent can be noted in the increased ease with which they perform steps which were at first all but beyond them.

This course which has been worked out under the direction of Dr. Ed. A. Bott, with such success as to attract international interest, will be carried into other Military Hospitals of the Commission as soon as proper provisions can be made.
