They may be unable to control a hand, a foot, or leg, or a bullet in the brain may have destroyed a motor area. Still other cases are those where injury or shock has affected some mental proshock has affected some mental process, such as memory, concentration or association.

All the conditions following these

injuries have their psychologicial as well as physical aspect, and a man's mental attitude toward his condition is shown to be vital.
