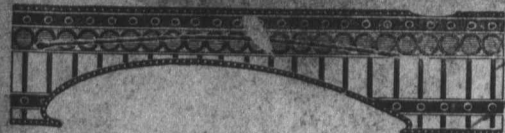

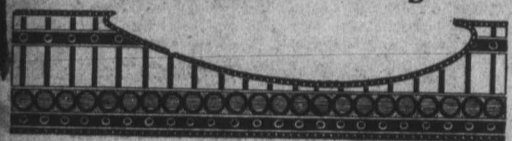

### LIBERAL CONSERVATIVE ASSOCIATION HOLD ANNUAL MEETING

Elects a Committee to Meet With Liberal Association Committee to Form a Basis of a Union Convention

The annual meeting of the Kings County Liberal-Conservative Association was held at the Court House, Kentville, on Saturday last. The meeting was called to order at 1.30 o'clock by President Dr. DeWitt.

The report of officers and committees were received and adopted. A large number paid their annual dues in order to qualify for election of officers.

The election of officers for the year resulted as follows: Hon. President—Dr. DeWitt, Wolfville. President—J. W. Ryan, Kentville. Vice-President—G. R. Nichols, Waterville.

Secy.—Trans.—H. G. Harris, Kentville. Auditor—F. A. Masters, Kentville.

The President, Dr. DeWitt, addressed the gathering dealing with questions of the day the formation of a Union Government and the probability of the Union of the two parties being carried out in Kings Co. by a gathering together of all who were supporters of the present Union Government into a larger association. He referred to the services to the party of His Honor Judge Webster and expressed the hearty approval of all in his elevation to the bench.

The following resolutions were unanimously carried: Resolved that we express our gratification and approval of the course adopted by Sir Robert Borden and that his statesmanlike, persistent and patriotic efforts have resulted in the uniting of the loyal forces of this County in the formation of a Union Government. We herewith in our Association assembled pledge him and his Government our loyal support in their work of guiding the destinies of the Dominion during the remaining trying and critical period of the war and during the reconstruction period that will follow the return of peace.

Moved by H. G. Harris, seconded by C. R. Bitt.

Resolved that the members of this Association express their sincere gratitude to the heroic services of the men who have gone from this constituency to engage in the great struggle in Europe now taking place in behalf of justice and liberty and also our sincere sympathy to all the friends and relations of those who have fallen in the conflict.

Further we hereby record our steadfast determination to do every thing in our power to ensure our gallant defenders the necessary supply of comforts and the reinforcements they so urgently need.

New Brunswick Quota \$2.75 per 90 lbs. Bag and Halifax \$2.15, P. E. I. Stock

OTTAWA, November 2—Correspondent of the Food Controller's Office yesterday reported the following wholesale prices for potatoes, all quotations being on the basis of a ninety pound bag:

Toronto—Ontario stock, \$1.80 to 1.90.

Montreal Market slow. Ontario and Quebec stock, \$2; New Brunswick \$2.25.

Quebec—Quebec stock \$2.10 to \$2.25. Halifax—Prince Edward Island stock \$2.15; Western Nova Scotia farmers receiving \$1.40 to \$1.50; Eastern Nova Scotia farmers receiving \$1.40.

St. John—New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island stock \$2.05 to \$2.30.

In Prince Edward Island the potato movement is temporarily held up on account of car shortage.

American prices—Boston \$2.40; New York, \$2.35.
