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

Indian's Bride Lost it and Her Jealous Husband Overtook and Killed Her.

Kamloops, B. C., July 24.-'Another ndian murder was committed here Sunday. Shortly after three o'clock in the afternoon two Indian women were seen riding up Fourth avenue at full gallop. They were closely pursued by an Indian on horseback, The Indian was armed with a Winchester corner of the Exhibition grounds he overhauled the women, raised his rifle, took deliberate aim at one of them, and fired. The bullet entered the poor woman's head near the mouth, and she instantly dropped from her horse to the street. The murderer, after firing another shot into her body made off towards the preserve, which is just across the river. An alarm was immediately given, and a number of Indians were in pursuit of the mur-derer. In half an hour they returned with the murderer, who proved to be a young Indian named Geo. St. Paul. The victim of his deadly work was his young wife. Whisky and salousy were the cause of the awful crime. The prisoner was immediately lodged in gaol, and the body of his victim taken to Gordon's undertaking establish-ment, where an inquest will be held to

To-day's tragedy took place within three blocks of the spot where poor Phil Walker was murdered by the Indian Casimer, a little over a year ago.

Formula for Lotion for Sunburn .-Milk, 1 pint; carbonate of soda, 1 oz.; glycerine, 1 oz.; powdered borax, 1/2 oz. Use several times a day if re-

is prepared as follows: Sweet almonds, blanched, 1 oz.; bitter almonds, 1-3 oz.; pound the almonds to a paste in a mortar with pestle: add rose water, 8 ozs.; strain through cheesecloth and add benzoate of soda, 15 grains.

An emollient poultice will work almost a miracle with a half-blistered face. The poultice must be renewed before it begins to get dry, and is composed of equal parts of rye and linseed meal, with enough warm water to make a rather thin paste. A mask is made of this same paste also and worn for several hours at a stretch. It has wonderfully healing effect. It is indispensable that the poultice or mask

should be kept moist. A preparation called milk of roses is excellent and if used every day will keep the sunburn from ever becoming painful. Make it as follows: Blanched almonds, 11/2 oz.; oil of almonds and white soft soap, of each, 1 dram; rose water, 12 ozs. Make an emulsion. To the strained emulsion add a mixture of essence of roses, 1/2 fluid dram; alcohol, 21/2 ounces; rose water sufficient to make the whole measure 1 pint. More alcohol is often ordered and used but too much of it is apt to cause a separation of the ingredients.
