### THE LATE DE WITT TALMAGE.

The Hamilton Spectator says: The late Rev. T. De Witt Talmage was the leader among the sensational preachers of America. He believed in saying odd things and doing odd things that attention to himself and his sermons might be attracted. His sermons, printed broadcast in the newspapers, were wonderfully popular, not because of their intrinsic worth, but because of their unusual nature. For years before his death Mr. Talmage was without a church, and delivered no sermons. But he continued to write them, and they were printed in 3,600 newspapers - the Spectator among the number-and regularly reached an audience of 30,000,000 of people. Mr. Talmage looked well out for number one, and the cash element in his sermon producing was well looked after. Indeed he was none too particular about his methods of advertising his sermons. Some years ago it was given out that he would preach on Mars Hill, would baptise persons in the Jordan, and do other things in the Holy Land. He neither preached on Mars Hill nor baptised anybody in the Jordan, but sermons alleged to have been delivered on those occasions were printed in the newspapers and paid for. And, on more than one occasion, the Spectator was furnished with a sermon alleged to have been delivered at Grimsby Camp, and which did not contain a line of the sermon really delivered there. These and similar things left Mr. Talmage open to the ridicule of scoffers, and detraced from his influence for good But there is no doubt that many millions of people found much comfort and instruction in his sermons.

## NOT WELL PUT.

A murderer is not fit to be classed with the Canadians who have fought and bled on the veldt. When justice demands that the law should be carried out to the extent of capital punishment, we do not think that it is well put to say that the criminal might as well be executed by a Boer bullet as on the gallows. Far better to keep such matters far apart.


