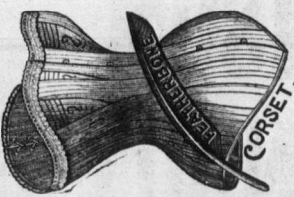

A CONTEMPLE THICK.—The
Moncton Times has convicted the
Transcript not only of stealing its re-
port of the prize winners at the
County rifle match last Thursday, but
also of wilfully changing the order in
which the prizes were awarded in
order to make it appear that the
Transcript was chosen before the
Times instead of after. This is a
pretty small business for a paper with
any pretensions to respectability, but
it is not the first time the Transcript
has resorted to the trick.

SHOP BREAKING.—Quite a ripple
of excitement was caused on Mon-
day morning by the announcement
that Mr. Geo. E. Ford's store had
been entered and robbed during the
preceding night. An examination
of the premises showed that an un-
successful attempt had been made to
open the front door, but it is sup-
posed that an entrance was effected
by raising the office window.
The safe was blown open with
gunpowder, a hole having been
drilled in the door for that purpose.
Mr. Ford is unable to tell the exact
amount that was taken, but his losses
comprise about \$70 in current
money, \$25 or \$35 in Maritime bank
bills, a gold draft drawn by the
Sackville agency of the Merchants'
Bank on the National Hotel and
Leather Bank, of Boston, in Mr.
Ford's favor, for \$38.75, and a
draft on the National Hotel, of Bos-
ton, for \$100, which was also taken.
The safe was broken by the use of
a stop watch, and three revolvers,
one being a Smith & Wesson, of 22
calibre and one a constabulary bul-
dog of about 44 calibre. A number
of cigars and some other articles
were also taken. The robbers then
visibly visited all parts of the
store, for some revolver cartridges,
were found on a table in the tailer-
ing department up stairs, but
strangely enough a large dog that
was in the store failed to give an
alarm. Mr. H. Berton Allison, who
was awakened by the explosion,
says that it took place about 3
o'clock Monday morning. The ex-
planation for the safe door so
violently against the wall that the
window casing was jammed so the
cash counts, and the robbers made
their exit by breaking
a large pane of glass in one of the
front doors. Mr. Dobson's harness
shop was entered the same night,
presumably by the robbers in search
of tools, and some tools belonging
to Mr. C. A. Doucett were found in
Mr. Ford's store. Mr. Ford has
used every means in his power to
trace the robbers, but no clue has
yet been obtained.
