If it is red blossom appears in Spring, plow under cloves and sorrel at once, rather than aliow sorrel to seed. The excessive growth of sorrel on some land is due to lack of lime and potash needed to secure a clover seeding. We have seen fields wholly covered with sor rel because nothing else would grow pro luce rank growth of clover with scarcely any sorrel, solely fron the effects of liberal dressing of leach ed ashes. Sorrel is not often very troublesome except were clover fails and this is due generally to exhaus-

tion of the mineral elements that the clover plant requires.

TREE ROOTS IN WELLS There are several kinds of trees which should not be planted near wells. Elm and locust roots we know will travel fifteen to twenty feet in search of water. Locust roots run deep, and will often find water when it does not come within ten or iwelve feet of the surface. It is best to cut them down when in full leaf, so as to prevent sprouting if they stand anywhere near a house well. The locust is often mistakenly planted near a house for shelter, and as the trees grow older they sure to give trouble if a well is any where near their reach. Their roots give a very unpleasant taste to water. In some cases this taste is the first

BURNING WEED SEEDS. At this season it is often the practice to pile up weeds whose seed have ripened, and after drying burn them. The process of drying causes the seeds to drop to th ground through the weeds. In burning, more of these seeds drop out. Carbonic acid gas settles near the ground in these light heaps, so that considerable proportion of these weed seeds often escape. When weeds stand closely enough to burn standing, only a small part of their seeds are destroyed. A little wood added to pi'e, of weeds, to make


