Treatment for Mosquito Bites.

The eye closed with the swelling, and suppuration set in; and after careful attention it was healed, but much anxiety was felt about the eye for a time. In spite of careful screening, one will often find its way into the chillested, will do serious damage. Fortunately all do not suffer to the

same extent from the poison, but I have seen a child's hand swelled to twice its natural size from three stings on the hand and wrist. If the bite is fresh, an application of listerine will sometimes neutralize the poison altogether.
