LAW AND JUSTICE.

County Court.

Before His Honor Judge Squire. Tuesday, Dec. 14. Court opened at 12 o'clock, noon. The following is the list of GRAND JURORS.

JUDGE'S ADDRESS TO THE GRAND JURY.

Mr. Foreman and Gentlemen of the Grand Jury.—The duty which devolves upon me of instructing you as to your duties is fortunately for me, not a very anxious one, for I perceive by the Sheriff's Calendar, and this is the only intimation I have of the fact, that there are no prisoners in gaol whose offences will require your consideration. One person is confined for want of sureties to keep the peace. He was some time ago brought before me for discharge, but, upon examination of the papers I thought proper to allow him to await his release until the General Sessions. Scarcely the insane prisoner, will be removed at once. Williamson, confined for four months as a vagrant, will be supported by the County. I am sorry to say, for that period. The prisoner Henry was sentenced by me this morning to six months' confinement in the "Andrew Mercer Reformatory for Females" at Toronto. She was charged with concealment of birth of a child, which of itself is a very serious crime; but upon examination of the evidence of Dr. Taylor, and upon consideration of the views of the Coroner, Dr. McLean, I thought, as I still think, that the prisoner had narrowly escaped a charge of infanticide. Considering her present age, about seventeen, I thought proper to remove her from her present surroundings and give her the opportunity of learning a useful trade, by sending her to the newly established Reformatory.

Let me say to you that the lightness of your duties is due somewhat to the absence of crime in this County; but mainly to the fact that all the minor criminals are disposed of in the County Judge's Criminal Court, where the person charged is at once brought before me upon a convenient day or to await his or her trial by a jury. During my term, some four years, two persons have elected to be tried by a jury, and I have disposed of over one hundred and sixty charges during the same period. I am informed that the Crown will have some business for your consideration. It is said that a person residing in the County has suffered injuries at the hands of his neighbors and that the magistrates in the vicinity refuse to give him any redress. If his statement is correct the magistrates are making a serious mistake. The remedy, however, is in your hands and I have no doubt you will apply it when the Crown sends you such evidence as is applicable. In this, as in all matters coming before you, you will have the able assistance of Mr. Lewis, the County Attorney.

It is your privilege, and in some sense your duty, to examine the County Gaol, High School and other institutions in which the County is interested and to make such presentation regarding them as you may think proper. Whatever you may say will be forwarded at once to the proper authorities. Whenever I receive intimation that your duties as Grand Jurors have been performed I shall be happy to discharge you.

Denbow vs Ontario Bank—An interpleader issue. Mr. H. W. C. Meyer for plaintiff; Garrow & Proudfoot for defendant. The plaintiff lives in the township of Morris, near Brussels. Her son in conjunction with his father purchased a threshing machine from the Joseph Hall Co., Oshawa, and gave their notes for the same which were discounted at the Ontario Bank, Oshawa. Shortly before the Bank obtained judgment against the Denbows, the son executed a mortgage to his mother on all his goods and chattels. The Bank claims that the chattel mortgage is invalid. Judgment and agreement postponed.

Molson's Bank vs Blake et al—Action on promissory notes, of defendants who had left for parts unknown. Garrow & Proudfoot for plaintiff; defendant not represented by counsel. Verdict for plaintiff by consent for \$1,111.95. Immediate execution moved for and granted.

Molson's Bank vs Oke—Action on promissory note. This was an action involving the decamping of Blake & Co., for whom defendant was an endorser. Garrow & Proudfoot for plaintiff; defendant not represented by counsel. Verdict for plaintiff by consent for \$1,921.39. Immediate execution moved for and granted.

McPhillips vs Sanders et al—Action on promissory note. Cameron, Holt & Cameron for plaintiff; defendant not represented by counsel. Verdict for plaintiff by consent for \$302.25.

Cameron et al vs Oke—Action on bond. Cameron, Holt & Cameron for plaintiff; defendant not represented by counsel. Verdict for plaintiff by consent for \$2,000. Immediate execution moved for and granted.

Cameron et al vs Blake et al—Action on promissory note. Cameron, Holt & Cameron for plaintiff; defendant not represented by counsel. Verdict for plaintiff by consent for \$3,421.90. Immediate execution moved for and granted.

Parsons vs Yager—Quitman action for non-registration of partnership. Garrow & Proudfoot and E. Campion for plaintiff; Mr. B. L. Doyle for defendant. Judgment reserved.

Gourlay vs Linton—Action on promissory note. Garrow & Proudfoot for plaintiff; Mr. E. Seager for defendant. Judgment reserved.

Court adjourned at 3 o'clock.

Wednesday, Dec. 15.

Court opened at 10 o'clock pursuant to adjournment. Bissett vs Radcliffe—Action for breach of warranty of a horse. Mr. B. L. Doyle for plaintiff; Mr. Harding for defendant. Verdict for plaintiff for \$125.

Thursday, Dec. 16. Court open in due form at 9.30. The Grand Jury brought in the following PRESENTMENT.

To His Honor Judge Squire. The Grand Jury of our Lady the Queen present that in conformity with your suggestion and a sense of duty on our part, we have visited the gaol. We find in all thirteen prisoners, 11 males and 2 females. One Wheatleigh has now been confined for 2 weeks in default of bonds to keep the peace. The Gaoler speaks highly of his conduct while a prisoner, and says that he has suffered severely from sickness during his imprisonment. In view of these facts we would recommend, if not defeating the ends of justice, he be discharged. One female and three male prisoners are undergoing short terms of imprisonment for minor offences. There are three males, Kelly, Mann and Williamson confined as vagrants, the two last named apparently contented, the first named, who is comparatively young man, fee a much aggrieved at being styled a vagrant. One prisoner is styled a vagrant for arsony. One young man (22) is awaiting, since Nov. 1st, his trial for forgery. Another young man was yesterday brought in on a charge of larceny. A very sad case is that of an insane young man named Scarff. The necessary papers are made out for his immediate removal to the asylum. We also found a young woman whom your Honor has recently sentenced to the Andrew Mercer Reformatory for six months, for concealment of birth. This, although an apparently severe sentence, will have a beneficial effect upon the unfortunate girl. We inspected the various apartments used by the prisoners and find a commendable aspect of cleanliness and order pervading them. The Gaol officials showed us every possible attention. We would remark that the excessive use of intoxicants would appear to be the chief factor in producing inmates for our Gaol. Your Grand Jury would also say that cases come before them which should be settled by magistrates. There are some instances a serious miscarriage of justice is brought about through Justices of the Peace, wittingly or unwittingly allowing themselves to be duped by interested, disorderly litigants. From papers submitted to us in the matter of R. Ferguson, it would appear that incipient Donnellyism is germinating in some sections of our County. We would therefore urge upon magistrates the necessity of their fearlessly doing their duty. We beg to congratulate your Honor on the light criminal record. We do so, keeping in mind the cases which come before your Honor and are disposed of at the Interim Sessions. We have to thank your Honor for the kind and clear manner in which you instructed us as to our duties. The County Attorney has also rendered us valuable assistance in his customary urbane manner.

County Judge's Criminal Court.

Regina vs Annie Henry—On Tuesday last the prisoner appeared for sentence. The Judge considering the crime a very serious one, sentenced her to six months' confinement in the Mercer Reformatory at Toronto. This is the first person sent to that institution from this county.

Thursday, Dec. 16. Joseph Wheatleigh appeared being unable to procure sureties for the peace. This is the wife brother who was sent to gaol some six weeks ago in default of finding sureties. His Honor, being of opinion that a salutary lesson had been taught prisoner, allowed him to depart after he (Wheatleigh) had entered into his own recognizance in \$100 to keep the peace towards Fanny, the beloved of his bosom, for one year.

HURON COUNTY COUNCIL.

Report of the Proceedings at the Wingham Meetings. Wingham, Dec. 8. The Council met pursuant to adjournment, the Warden in the chair. All the councillors were present except Messrs. Allan, Stennum, Dettor and Carter. The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

A petition was read from John Moffatt, and seventy others of the village of Wroxeter, praying that a By-law be passed compelling hawkers and peddlers, to pay a license of \$100 to the County. Referred to School and Printing Committee. A petition was read from Mr. Kidd and 29 others, of Seaford, to the same effect. Also a petition of Mr. Hanna and 18 others, of the town of Wingham to the same effect.

The report of Mr. Gibson, road commissioner, was read and referred to Road and Bridge Committee. Also the report of Mr. Hardy, road commissioner.

Twelve tenders for gaol supplies were referred to the Gaol and Court House Committee. A number of accounts were referred to the Financial Committee.

Moved by Mr. Walker, seconded by Mr. Girvin, that each municipality be paid its boundary line appropriation, as per schedule of last June minutes. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Strachan, seconded by Mr. Hisslop, that the sum of \$17 be repaid to the County by the Gaol, said sum being paid for the erection of a bridge on the assumed boundary line between the townships of Grey and Elma. Referred to Financial Committee.

A letter was read from Mr. Meyer in reference to the new road allowance to Bayfield bridge. Referred to Finance Committee.

Report of Mr. Girvin, road commissioner, was read and referred to Road and Bridge Committee. A number of accounts were referred to Finance Committee.

Moved by Mr. Hays, seconded by Mr. Hanna, that the Clerk send blank forms of tenders for the county printing for next year, the same as heretofore. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Gibson, seconded by Mr. McMillan, that in future all advertising be done by the paper that does the county printing. Lost on a division by a majority of 33.

Moved by Mr. Graham, seconded by Mr. Ford, that this Council do now adjourn to meet again at 3 o'clock p. m. to-morrow. Carried.

December 9th. The Council met pursuant to adjournment, the Warden in the chair. All the Councillors were present except Dettor, Stennum, Allan and Carter. The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

A number of accounts were presented and referred to Finance Committee. Moved by Mr. Hays, seconded by Mr. Hennings, that this Council do now adjourn to meet again in one hour. Carried.

The Council resumed, the Warden in the chair. Report of Mr. Menzies, road commissioner was read and referred to Road and Bridge Committee. Report of School and Printing Committee was read and adopted.

Your Committee would beg to report as follows on the various matters submitted for their consideration: With regard to the motion to abolish the June meeting of the County Council, we recommend that no action be taken in the matter. With reference to the petition from Seaford, Wingham, &c., praying that pedlers' licenses be raised to \$100, we recommend that no action be taken in the matter. All of which is respectfully submitted.

G. BUCHANAN, Chairman. Report of the Gaol and Court House Committee was read and adopted.

Your committee beg leave to report as follows: In the matter of the report of Mr. LeBrun relative to the acoustics of the court room, recommend that the first section, which recommends the lowering of the ceiling be only proceeded with at present, under the sanction of the Warden's Committee. Would recommend that the tender of A. McKinnon, for 100 cords of wood for the Gaol be accepted, it being the lowest. Would recommend that the tender of D. Ferguson, for Gaol supplies be accepted, it being the lowest. Would recommend that tender of S. Andrews, for beef for the Gaol be accepted, it being the lowest, 5c. per lb. Would recommend that J. Watson's tender for bread for Gaol be accepted at 3c. per lb. With regard to the communication of Mr. Langmuir, relative to prison clothing for females, would recommend that no action be taken in the matter of ordering any clothing, as we have very few females incarcerated in our gaol. All of which is respectfully submitted.

JOHN KAINE, Chairman. Moved by Mr. Wilson, seconded by Mr. Dr. Williams and Francis, do now adjourn to meet again at one o'clock p. m. to-morrow. Carried.

December 10th. Council met pursuant to adjournment, the Warden in the chair. All the Councillors were present except Messrs. Allan, Dettor, Carter and Stennum. The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

A letter was read from Mr. Langmuir, relative to prison clothing for females. Referred to Gaol and Court House Committee. Moved by Mr. Gibson, seconded by Mr. Weir, that this Council do now adjourn for one hour to examine Graham's bridge. Carried.

The Council resumed, the Warden in the chair. Moved by Mr. Bell, seconded by Mr. Hennings, that this Council grant the petition of J. C. Prouty, that he be settled in full of all claims in reference to Graham's bridge, and that Rule No. 62 be suspended for this purpose. Yeas—Messrs. Moved by Mr. Buchanan, seconded by Mr. Kaine, that this Council do now adjourn to meet again at 8 o'clock p. m. Carried.

8 o'clock p. m. Council resumed, the Warden in the chair. Moved by Mr. Kaine, seconded by Mr. Hardy, that this Council before adjourning for the year desire to convey to Mr. Stennum, the respected Deputy Reeve of Grey, its sympathy for him in his protracted illness, which, now, for the second session has kept his seat vacant, and that the Clerk be requested to communicate to him the purport of this resolution. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Kaine, seconded by Mr. Young, that the sum of \$5 be paid to each of the road commissioners for postage and stationery.

REPORT OF THE SALARIES COMMITTEE. Application of Chief Constable Currie for the continuation of the salary that was allowed to the late Chief Constable Trainer, said salary amounting to \$175. We recommend that the grant be \$100, the effect from the date of his appointment.

Application from the Clerk of the Peace, for a stated salary in lieu of all fees, now payable to him by the County. We would recommend that the sum of \$1,000 be paid Mr. Lewis, which sum Mr. Lewis has signified he will accept. This sum to be paid quarterly. All of which is respectfully submitted.

A. L. GIBSON, Chairman. Moved by Mr. Young, seconded by Mr. Griffin, that all the plans and specifications for building bridges be returned to the Clerk of the County who may be found serviceable for future bridge building, after the contractor has finished the work, with the coat of the work attached. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Graham, seconded by Mr. Walker, that private contractors who may have the use of the County's spile driver in the County should pay \$2 per day for the use of the same, not including the days in removing and returning it, on condition that said contractor have an order for it from the Reeve of the municipality where such work is being executed. Carried.

REPORT OF ROAD AND BRIDGE COMMITTEE. Report of Mr. A. L. Gibson, bridge commissioner. We would recommend that the suggestions in his report be carried out, and the work mentioned to be attended to in the proper time, if found on examination to be necessary.

Report of Mr. Hardy, pointing out some work that will be needed in his neighborhood next year. We would recommend that it be carried out in the proper season. With regard to the bridge on the McGillivray boundary, for which he was instructed to have a plan and specifications prepared for this meeting of the Council, which the Engineer of the County of Middlesex agreed with him to furnish, but has as yet failed to do, we would recommend that, if possible, the plan should be procured for the January meeting, and tenders for the work, subject to the approval of the Council.

Report of Mr. Girvin, stating that he expects to have a small expenditure next year in his neighborhood, your committee are glad to learn that we have the prospect of lighter taxes for that purpose in the coming year.

Report of Mr. Menzies of work completed and indicating some work that will be required next year. A bridge at Summerhill will need to be rebuilt. We would recommend that plans be obtained for a light Howe truss bridge with tenders for the work, to be laid before the January meeting of the Council for their approval. With regard to the Grand Bend bridge, repaired, would recommend that Mr. Hardy be authorized to have it put in a proper state of repair, and the Lambton Council, intimating to them that they will be required to pay half the expenses.

All of which is respectfully submitted. ALEX. L. GIBSON, Chairman. Moved by Mr. Hays, seconded by Mr. Chidley, that the Warden and Clerk be authorized to memorialize the Local Legislature to so amend the municipal law, so there be no exemptions from taxation except government and municipal property, public schools, and public cemeteries. Also that public property be assessed wherever found.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Strachan, seconded by Mr. Weir, that the words, "the lands actually occupied by buildings used for public worship," be added to the motion. Carried on a division by a majority of nine. The original motion then as amended was carried by a majority of nine.

By-law No. 9, 1880, was read and passed, making provision to pay the Clerk of the Peace a salary in lieu of fees payable to him by the County.

Moved by Mr. Gibson, seconded by Mr. Strachan, that the Council do now adjourn.

Sudden Death. A man named William Squier, who resided on one of the short streets running off West-street, died rather suddenly on Thursday morning. Deceased was an Englishman, and had been in Canada some six years. For five years he had been afflicted with heart disease, liver complaint and dropsy. About two years since he removed from Clinton to Goderich, and since last year has at different times been the recipient of aid from the Town Council, necessitated by his inability to work. For the past month he had been in failing health, owing to the infirmities with which he was afflicted and scant nourishment, and on Thursday morning about 2 P. M. he succumbed. Starvation had as much to do with his death as his above-named ailments. He leaves a wife and four children in destitute circumstances.
