### Mr. Hickman's Resolutions.

Yesterday in the House of Assem bly, at the appointed time Mr. Hickman rose to move his Resolutions on Prohibition. There was a general feeling that such an important de-bate could best be undertaken in a Committee of the Whole, and this was agreed upon. Hon. Charles Emerson rose to suggest the postponement of the debate to a day next week, such as Wednesday, and that in the mean time the Resolutions should be print ed and copies placed in the hands of members. This was readily assented to by Mr. Hickman and agreed upon to by Mr. Hickman and agreed upon by the House and the debate was set down for Wednesday next and order-ed to be placed first on the Order of the Day. We understand that the Resolutions set forth the desirability of prohibiting the importation into Newfoundland and its dependencies of spirituous liquors, wines and alco ic ales, beer and porter, and that the manufacture and sale of the lighter alcoholic beers within the Colony be made a Gov't monopoly. The passing of such an expression of opinion by the House of Assembly would be tanta-mount to a call upon the Government to introduce practical legislation in the House for the consideration of the Legislature, which would have for its broad effect the prohibition of the consumption of spirits, wines and other imported alcoholic beverages. The consumption of alcoholic beverages would be limited to such light beers as would be manufactured by the Government, who would also con-Those employed in the manufacture and sale would become civil servants. Such propositions will undoubtedly evoke strong expressions of opinions and the furnishing of important data as to the effect of similar legislation elsewhere. If the Resolutions pass and the Government takes up a measure based on these lines, they will have to devise some means of meeting the shortage of revenue which comes from the high duties paid on the importation of these beverages. No more important discusion has ever been proposed in a concrete form in the Legislature, and the propositions demand most careful consideration and thoughtful deliberation. To give one some idea of what this sum really amounts to it is best to calculate it in sovereigns. This works out at 16,625 tons.
