This warning was flagrantly set at nought by the murder of nearly 100 Americans on the Lusitania. The Kaiser has not only refused to give the United States any satisfaction for this attack on her neutrality, but has re-warded the sea huns for carrying in out, and has attempted to repeat it. In his last Note, President Wilson informs the German Government that it is the intention of the United States send it TO-DAY. to regard as "deliberately any re-petition by commanders of German naval vessels of acts in contravention of American rights. This is merely a stronger way of putting the position already laid down by President Wil son. President Wilson also expresses the belief that Germany will no longer "refrain from disavowing the wan ton act of its naval commander in sinking the Lusitania, or from offering reparation for American lives lost, so far as reparation can be made for the needless destruction of human life by an illegal act."

For the Kaiser to disavow this act, would be for him to disavow an act deliberately planned and foreshadowed by him through the acts of his embassy at Washington, and for him to disavow the decoration he gave the submarine commander for carrying it out. Moreover, any such disavowal would be a new scrap of paper to be repudiated at the Kaiser's convenience, as he did with the Belgian treaty, his agreement with the Vatton his agreement with the Vatican, I with international usage for honrable warfare.
