DUTCH REPRISALS.

Rotterdam, To-day. The Dutch newspapers, say the German steamers have been transferred to the Rotterdam-Lloyd, and the Dutch Lloyd, to replace six ships torpedoed off the Scheldt. All the steamers at present in Dutch ports.

PERONE NEXT.

PARIS, Aug. 30. (Havas Agency.)—The British line of the Somme has been carried to the points indicated in last week's statement from Field Marshal Haig, and the British line is now several miles east of Cambes. According to reports to the newspapers, the advance continues and the line of Peronne is predicted.

AUSTRALIANS BUSY.

LONDON, Aug. 30. Australian troops are now about 100 miles from the outskirts of Peronne. The Australian representative in the British front reports the Australians captured Favières, Herbécourt, Flaucourt, Avesville, Barleux and other villages. In the process they have recovered 125 miles of territory and nearly 100 villages, most of which are in ruins.

FRENCH MAINTAIN GAINS.

PARIS, Aug. 30. (Havas Agency.)—The French counter-attacks between the Ailette and the Aisne were the last night by the French, says War Office statement to-day. The French maintained their gains east of Pally and north of Solons.

GERMANS POCKETED AGAIN.

WITH THE FRENCH ARMY IN FRANCE, Aug. 29 (By the A.P.)—The operations of the past night, the French pushed the Germans into another pocket between the Canal du Nord, and the Aisne. They will have to evacuate it promptly, or run a big risk of being surrounded.

Bergsdalen Torpedoed Without Warning

From the chief mate of the torpedoed Norwegian steamer Bergsdalen we received the following details of the sinking: At 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon when about 120 miles off Cape Race, the torpedo struck the ship in No. 4 hatch, and within 2½ minutes the ship sank. Immediately the torpedo struck two lifeboats were lowered, while the remainder of the crew jumped overboard to be picked up later by the boats. The torpedo exploded, tearing the bottom out of the Bergsdalen, so that she was not long in going down. Not a sign of the submarine was seen before or after. The boats were steered toward the Nova Scotia coast until 9.30 that evening when a large Swedish steamer was sighted. This ship picked them up at 10 o'clock and landed them at Cape Race. From Cape Race they came to Cape Broyle in their lifeboats, and thence to St. John's by train. They are now staying at the Seamen's Institute, where everything possible for their comfort is being done.

Fire at Clarke's Beach.

Yesterday afternoon a fire at Clarke's Beach destroyed completely two barns and hay valued at \$500.00, the property of Joseph Coveyduck. The dwelling house nearby was only saved by the strenuous work of the neighbors who came on the scene and who kept layers of wet blankets and sheets on the roof and sides nearest the fire. The distance from the burning barn being only a few yards, its safety may also be attributed to the fact that there was no wind. The fire was probably caused by children playing in the barn with lighted matches. Mr. Coveyduck to whom the loss will be a serious one, as there is no insurance, is at present at Labrador, and the sole occupants of the house were his daughter, Mrs. Batten, and her children. In the fear that the fire would reach the house, Mrs. Batten hurriedly left the house, taking a \$20 note from the mantel. In the rush the note was lost and up to the time the train left had not been recovered.

Was It a Sub?

If we can believe the story of seaman Bree of the whaler Port Saunders, who states positively that he saw a submarine lurking in the waters of Cape Broyle Head yesterday morning, we must conclude that the Hun pirates are, as it were, at our very doors. The facts as learned by the Telegram this morning are as follows: At 3.15 yesterday morning the whaler Port Saunders, Capt. Anderson in command, was out whale hunting and was steaming along about 17 miles southwest of Cape Broyle Head when Bree reported a boat resting on the surface about six miles off. Thinking it was a schooner turned bottom up, Capt. Anderson steered his ship in the direction from which the boat was seen, but after a half hour's steaming saw no sign of the mysterious craft. Whether there was a real submarine or merely a delusion of Bree we are not prepared to say, and therefore give the story for what it is worth.

Generous and Patriotic Deed

IN BEHALF OF EDUCATION.

Mr. George B. Ayre gave the Directors of the Church of England College a glad surprise at a meeting of the Board held last night. It is pretty well known that the Directors are planning to erect a new and handsome building for Bishop Field and Bishop Spencer Colleges. The plans, however, are on a large scale and it will probably take some years to accomplish them. In the meantime the Directors were not satisfied with the present accommodation for Bishop Spencer College and were anxious to effect some arrangement by which better provision could be made for the excellent work done at Bishop Spencer College. It is just at this point that Mr. Geo. B. Ayre has come forward with a most generous and patriotic offer. He has purchased the property of the British Society on Bond Street and has offered to place it at the disposal of the Directors for the use of Bishop Spencer College for so long a time as they may desire it at a rental of one silver dollar a year. His offer, indeed, goes further, for he likewise undertakes the cost of making the structural alterations that may be necessary, to adapt the building to the needs of the College and to put the whole into good condition. A further good that results from Mr. Ayre's munificence is that the class-rooms at present occupied by Bishop Spencer College in the Synod Building can be added to the Central Schools, and in this way the school accommodation for the elementary work of the Church in St. John's will be provided.

The Directors were well overwhelmed with feelings of gratitude and appreciation. They could not help feeling that this act of Mr. Ayre was one of the most generous contributions to education in the history of the Colony. The whole thing, magnanimously conceived and speedily executed, indicates a very fine spirit in Mr. Ayre and the Directors desire to give public expression of their thanks to him.
