

**ARRANT HYPOCRISY**

"What then are Mr. Coaker's intentions regarding St. John's? Let us look back upon Mr. Coaker's actions during the several years he has been a member of the Newfoundland Government."

"Did he injure St. John's. Not at all. They say he will injure St. John's this time, that's what they've always said when it suited them."—(Star, Thursday.)

For consummate cheek, arrant hypocrisy and deliberate falsehood, the above extract from yesterday's (Thursday) Star takes foremost place. To make use of such language, after abusing and damning Coaker and his satellites, from the day the Star was started until Squires and Coaker entered into their unholy alliance a few weeks ago, should be sufficient to disgust every right thinking man in this community. For the past eight years Coaker's paper have ever been threatening St. John's, attacking the Merchants, people generally, and undermining them as a pack of drunken bums, etc. The Star asks if Coaker has injured St. John's and its people, perhaps he did not, but he left no stone unturned to vilify and calumniate them from the highest to the lowest, in fact, he used epithets as low and vulgar as Coaker and Mosdell used towards each other until a few weeks ago. The "Star" will doubtless ask for proof. Let him turn up Coaker's papers since the "Star" was started in the literary field, and ascertain therein what called forth the serious charges made by them one against the other. Does Mosdell or Coaker think for one moment that the people of St. John's are so forgetful that they cannot remember the choice expressions which the one hurled at the other for years, and how Mosdell denounced Coaker as to the manner he conducted his business, running it under water, establishing a propaganda of distrust and hatred between the merchants of St. John's and the fishermen of the Island, in a word, denouncing Coaker as a Socialist, anarchist and one in whom the Fisher-

men in particular should have no confidence. Was there a word in the vocabulary of vituperation that Mosdell did not fling at Coaker, and Coaker return in language more fitted for a low bawdy or pot-house than issuing from a printing office to be perused by a civilized community—more especially the younger portion of it. Even Mosdell's professional standing was assailed, and he was placed in the same category as the infamous Black Doctor of Sydney, a wretch that should have been strung up to the nearest lamp-post. How often has Mosdell accused Coaker of endeavoring to injure St. John's and its people? And yet that hypocritical and weak-kneed hireling has now the impudence to defend Coaker as being one of the angels of this world, whereas in a few months ago he branded him through his columns as not alone a demon in this sordid sphere, but one who would hold a most prominent position in the hot places we are told so much about, in the world to come. The Telegram is well aware that we are addressing an intelligent people, when we write for the people of St. John's, and all we ask them is to bring their minds back a few months ago, and pass their opinion on the sincerity which exists between these two canting hypocrites and modern Ananiases, Coaker and Mosdell, when we have had such daily exhibitions of hatred, malice, abuse and scurrility hurled at each other, which has certainly never been equalled in the annals of Newfoundland journalism. The people of St. John's may wish to know the true character of W. F. Coaker. We say turn up the back files of the Daily Star. They may also wish to know something about Dr. Mosdell. We say turn up the back files of Coaker's paper, the Advocate. And while they are at it they might get hold of Coaker's opinion of Squires, be clear and emphatic one of—that Black Rascal Squires. The people of St. John's can ascertain for themselves, when both papers would not be touched by respectable citizens of St. John's owing to their filthy abuse.
