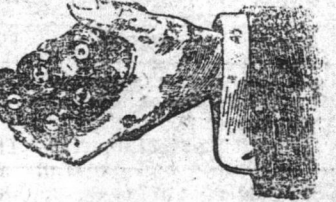

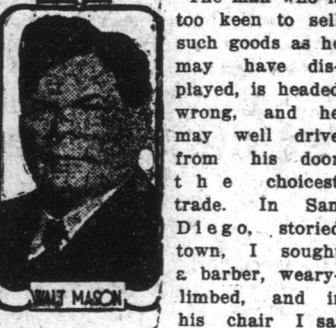

Again referring to the papers of the Hearst Syndicate, the Count says: "With their sharp anti-English tendency they did us more good than papers with an admitted pro-German bias."
No doubt the average American is just as proud of Hearst and his dirty rags and their part in the war as is the average Canadian.—Saturday Night.

A Modern Rendering.

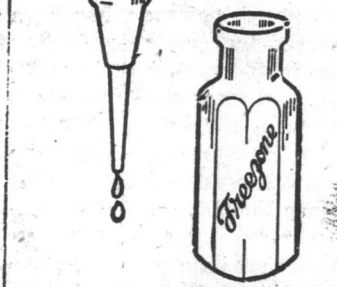
