Bishop Feild College Speech Day.

The annual Speech Day of Bishop Feild College was held last night in the Synod building. Owing to unforeseen circumstances the operetta which as a rule, formed part of the programme, had to be omitted. The first item on the programme was an exhibition of drill by a special squad selected from C. Co. of the B.F.C. Cadets. This exhibition was really splendid and Major Raley, who trained the squad, deserves great praise for the excellent results which crowned his efforts. An exhibition of drill by the little fellows of the Preparatory department followed, and was greatly appreciated by the audience. After the conclusion of the drills, the Headmaster, Mr. R. Wood, B.A., presented his report. He spoke of the difficulties under which the school had laboured during the past year. Besides being short-staffed, for one fifth of the year the boarding department was under quarantine, thus greatly handicapping the work of the school. Nevertheless, he was pleased to be able to announce that in the year under review, the school results were the best on record. Moreover, in athletics the school had not done at all badly, and had carried off the Rugby football championship. His Lordship, Bishop White then introduced His Excellency the Governor, who was to distribute the prizes. His Excellency, who, by the way, is himself an old Feildian, in a short address, emphasised the need, as a sensible part of a school curriculum, of physical exercise of some sort, as well as book work. He then proceeded to distribute the prizes, a list of which is appended. After the prize distribution, speeches were made by Dr. Blackall, C. of E. Superintendent of Education, and some of the directors, after which the usual college cheers were given. The proceedings came to a close with the singing of the national Anthem.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

INSTRUCTION TO GOVERNMENT.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.

An arrangement of the Coalition Government for what was described as its lack of sincerity in its policy toward Ireland, was presented by two English women to the Commission of the Committee of One Hundred investigating the Irish question. Miss Ellen C. Wilkinson, of Manchester, one of the women, declared that if a referendum was taken it would be found that the mass of British opinion was not behind the government in its present policy toward Ireland. Mrs. Arnot E. Robinson, also of Manchester, joined her in the declaration that while the British public hardly was ready to accept a Sinn Fein plan of an Irish Republic, Ireland can be won yet if the government adopt a sincere policy. Both women indicated their belief that Dominion Home Rule would prove the final solution of the Irish question.

BONE SETTING BY WIRELESS.

BOSTON, Dec. 21.

How the chief surgeon on the Leyland liner, Winifredian, directed by wireless the setting of a seaman's broken bones and care of internal injuries on Belgian steamer Menapier, after she had been battered by a hurricane, was told to-day when the Winifredian reached port from Liverpool. The surgeon is Dr. Patrick Burns of Providence, a veteran of the medical service in war.

RACE RIOTS.

LONDON, Dec. 21.

A Reuters despatch from Melbourne says that rioting at Brooks reported in a Central News despatch from Perth, Australia, to-day, was due to racial antipathy between Japanese and Malays. A thousand Japanese scoured the town for Malays. Two Japanese were killed and three Malays were badly injured.

GETTING UNEASY.

NEW YORK, Dec. 21.

A demand that the money collected in New York to promote the welfare of an Irish Republic, but held in banks in United States, immediately be sent to Ireland, was to-day addressed to President Eamonn De Valera by a local Council of the Friends of Irish Freedom.

INCREASING POLICE FORCE.

NEW YORK, Dec. 21.

The board of estimate to-day adopted a resolution to increase New York city's police force by 769 patrolmen, as requested by Commissioner Enright.

BOLSHEVISTIC MINERS.

LONDON, Dec. 22.

A general strike of coal miners in Rhondda cold fields of South Wales has been declared, in consequence of the refusal of the Ocean Coal Company to reinstate eleven men, dismissed on the ground that their work was not remunerative to the Company. Forty five thousand, engaged in the strike, are trying to persuade the South Wales Miners Federation to call out all the Welsh miners.

2,000,000 UNEMPLOYED.

LONDON, Dec. 22.

Lloyd George, replying in the House of Commons to-day to criticisms of Government schemes to remedy unemployment, expressed the fear that the problem could only be solved by resort to emigration within the Empire until the world was in a more settled condition. He hoped that the Imperial Conference, next May would discuss this question. Sir Robert Horne, Minister of Labor, stated that on December 2, there were over half a million men registered as unemployed.

PROROGATION IN FEBRUARY.

LONDON, Dec. 22.

Parliament will not be prorogued until February 15, it was announced in the House of Commons to-day.

ROYAL SIGNATURE.

ROME, Dec. 22.

King Victor Emanuel, yesterday signed the Treaty of Rapallo.

PLUNDERERS DRIVEN OFF.

CORK, Dec. 22.

The invaders levelled revolvers, but the police on duty promptly opened fire and one raider was killed and several persons wounded. A simultaneous attempt made to raid the Post Office on Douglas Street was made. The purpose of the raiders appears to be plunder, but they secured no booty.

MILITARY HEADS FALLING.

LONDON, Dec. 22.

The removal or resignation of Major General Strickland, in command of the troops in Munster, impends, according to the Labor Herald. The newspaper says the Government has already received Strickland's interim report on the burning of Cork, and the Central News says that General Tudor, Commander of the auxiliary police in Ireland, has been granted indefinite leave of absence.

GETTING AFTER CRIMINALS.

NEW YORK, Dec. 22.

Armed with repeating rifles, twenty sharpshooters of the police force scoured the city last night in automobiles in a hunt for bandits. Other drastic measures to check the crime wave have been launched by the

police and judges. Precautions against crime were taken throughout New Jersey, where several robberies and acts of violence occurred yesterday.
