Who He Is and What He Is.

When Lieutenant-Governor Grant of Nova Scotia cracks his pistol to-morrow morning at 11 o'clock in front of the Y.M.C.A. on Barrington Street in Halifax, 120 runners will start off on the Halifax Herald Modified Marathon, which has now become the Eastern classic in road events. Never was there a larger or more brilliant card of starters, and among them will be the veteran Alfie Rodgers, who has won the event for the past two years; McAlay, the noted Windsor long-distance man who holds the Nova Scotia record for 10 miles; and our own Newfoundland champion, John Bell. They are the three favourites, and according to the Halifax papers one of them must be regarded as the logical winner. The betting gives them long odds over the other competitors, though it must be remembered that in 1914, when McAlay established the record for this distance he was unknown and was not even considered.

Twelve years ago when long distance running became the craze of the athletic world—when such men as Dorando, Shrub, and Tommy Hayes hung up new laurel wreaths for their respective countries—the whole North American continent became interested, and road events from the 5 mile up to the full distance 24 mile marathon became the order of the day. It was then that the happy thought was conceived in the brain of the proprietor of the Halifax Herald, the late Senator William Dennis, to donate a massive silver trophy for a 10 mile road race to be run annually at Halifax; the conditions being that it must be won by a Canadian (not necessarily in succession) before becoming the absolute property of any one contestant. In addition there are 23 gold and silver medals presented each year.

It is difficult indeed to compute the direct moral and physical result of Senator Dennis's action. It has meant each year that from seventy to one hundred men have been living clean, decent, lives in preparation for the event, and they furnish to the growing generation each season a glowing example of pure, wholesome living and physical development. Fred Cameron, who won it one year, afterwards became a successful professional, as did Hans Holmer. In 1919 and 1920 we see a comparatively old man, ("Old" as we regard it in the field of athletics) Alf Rogers, at thirty-seven years of age, carry it off twice in succession, and now making a bold attempt this year for the absolute possession of the coveted trophy.

Last year witnessed Newfoundland's first entry into the fray when Mr. Jack Tobin (the well known hockeyist and oarsman) with two or three friends started a subscription list for the purpose of sending our acknowledged champion—John Bell—to Halifax to compete. The public were enthusiastic, and a week later saw Bell and his manager, Mr. J. L. Wainwright, start off. Unfortunately, Bell contracted a severe stomach cold en route, and despite the best medical attention that Halifax could give, was in no fit condition to enter the gruelling event. However, nothing would deter him from starting, but he had not completed his third mile when he was seized with an attack of violent vomiting and had to discontinue. On his return home, his friends, though sadly disappointed at the outcome of his venture into outside athletics, did not lose their faith in his ability and he was taken hold of by Mr. Harvey Thomas. He subsequently ran at the indoor Dominion Sports in November, and slipped on the 16 miles in the record indoor time of 58:15. All this Spring he was being conditioned under the able tutelage of Harvey, and the Summer season saw him victor in every one of the events he entered. Due to the earnest endeavours of his trainer, a committee known as the National Sports Committee was formed to finance his entry again in the Halifax race this year. With the generous support of the public behind them, they have floated a sweepstake which promises to be a success financially, although some tickets remain yet to be sold. Bell with his trainer was sent off five weeks before the scheduled date for the race, in order to become thoroughly acclimatized and to study the course, and to-day—the eve of the big event—finds him the favourite in Halifax.

Bell is a well set-up young fellow standing about 5ft. 8, weighs 15 pounds. He is 27 years old, married, and has two lovely little children. He has been in the running game for 13 past ten years, and though beaten by his earlier efforts by such veterans as Wall and Kavanagh, just kept right on. In 1912 found him securing his big win—the 6 mile road race at Mt. Cashin. He duplicated this in 1913 and 1915. The past season he won 10 mile race at the C.B.S. Sports, a also at the Guards—in each instance having a very comfortable lead over his nearest competitor. In the A. Sports he easily vanquished all opponents in the 5 mile event. I remember that the public has a very good "foretelling" it would be as we to jog our memory a bit by recalling that Bell was one of the carmen in the winning amateur crew of 1920, as well as a player on the B.I.S. football team when they annexed the championship last year. This season through the insistence of his manager Mr. Thomas, he decided to forego both branches for fear of injuries. Bell is a most unassuming boy with a cheerful, happy disposition, and is a private favourite with all. He has absolutely no side or swank and just states publicly. Beyond a big good-natured smile, it is difficult to get him even to talk, and when he does it is never about himself or his prowess. He is the ideal type of athlete we want to represent Newfoundland—"neither a booster nor a knocker." Thanks to the untiring energies of his trainer and manager—A. Harvey Thomas—he is absolutely in the pink of condition, and a wire received to-day states that never did he feel better or more confident.

The eyes of the whole country are on him to-morrow, and with bated breaths and hopeful hearts his legion of admirers will await the cheerful flash over the Anglo wires that
