Bulgarian Premier Forces a General European Upheaval.

SOFIA, Bulgaria. Alexander Stamboulsky, since his advent to power as Bulgaria's peasant-premier, has been furnishing Europe with no little amusement by the unceremonious and defiant way he has been treating King Boris, and by his indifferent attitude toward the ever present question of reparations. Not long ago he told the king that if he did not do the bidding of the masses, he might find himself without a throne and in the midst of a Republic. He added a warning that young Boris must not keep his eye on both sides of the fence; that he could give his support only to one party, and that party the group in power. The stalwart Agrarian leader also has given voice to equally novel expressions on various questions of the day. "My enemies," he says "ask the King to throw me over. But that would not be in conformity with constitutional usage. And then they do not know the King. I have him well trained. We are going to amalgamate the Agrarians, Radicals and Social Democrats for the elections of 1924, unless I am assassinated in the meantime.

REPARATIONS ARE HUMBUG.
"I like the Bulgarian Communists," Stamboulsky declares, "because they support me without any engagement on my part, which is convenient for me. The Communists are practical people, and they will shortly become a party fit to govern. They are forgetting their principles more and more, and they know how to accommodate themselves to circumstances. They know how to talk so as to please people." The Premier says he does not care a snap about reparations. "Reparations are humbug. My connections abroad are much stronger and more numerous than were those of King Ferdinand. Ferdinand knew only crowned heads of no importance while I am on intimate terms with the ruling politicians of the whole world. There is no danger. Nobody will touch Bulgaria. I have got promises. And when we have come to an understanding with Kristo Rakovski, Commissary in the Ukraine, the Soviets will not abandon us." Mr. Stamboulsky has voiced a warning as to the future. "Even should nothing else happen," he declares, "there will be a general mix-up before long. Russia is persistently preparing a debacle which is inevitable. We shall plunge into this upheaval too, and something is sure to come out of it. Wait and see."

Steel Airplanes Weigh Less Than Wooden Ones.

Great Britain possesses an all-steel airplane, a distinct departure in aerial construction. Except for its canvas wings the entire machine is built of steel. Nevertheless, it is 4 per cent lighter than a wooden airplane of the same dimensions. The claim is made that this machine shows a great advance over German airplanes constructed of aluminum alloy which is said to lack the strength of British steel. It is equipped with two Napier 1,000 horsepower engines. Although designed as a fast long distance bomber, it is said to be easy to maneuver as a little fighting scout. This is because of its steel construction, which permits the grouping of all weights. Advantages claimed for all steel airplanes are greater strength, increased load carrying capacity, ease of manufacturing in large quantities, and the fact that they are less vulnerable to bullets and shrapnel while flying, and also they are virtually fireproof.

The Growth of Glass.

HISTORY DOES NOT STATE WHO INVENTED THIS NECESSARY OF EVERYDAY LIFE.

When you admire yourself in a mirror, break a window-pane, or put on your spectacles, do you ever think about the history of that indispensable substance—glass? It is believed to have been first "worked" in Egypt about 1550 B.C. so that it is not exactly a new ideal. The simpler process of "blowing" glass did not appear until 100 B.C. Two hundred years later we find the Romans using glass extensively and establishing centres for its manufacture. Glass articles have been found in the old catacombs.

Nero is said to have given the equivalent of £50,000 for two special glass cups, thus beating even present-day prices for rare glassware. When the lost city of Pompeii was excavated, windows of glass were found in some of the houses. From the Romans, the art of glass-making spread all over Europe, Lincoln and Chartres becoming famous glassware centres in France. About the year 1180 glass was introduced into England from France; and later, French experts crossed to England and taught their methods. France also seems to have taken the lead in the manufacture of plate and mirror glass.

Bottles and Biscoulers.
Damascus, Aleppo, Cairo, and Alexandria became noted centres for smelting glassware, and the industry was established in Venice before the Thirteenth Century.

In England, glass monopolies were soon established. Sir R. Mansell holding the monopoly in this country from 1518-1553. The first bottle factory in England dates from about 1571, and the first English plate-glass works from 1674, this being at Lambeth. In the middle of the Eighteenth Century cut glass was introduced, and the art spread throughout Europe. The great glass centre at that time were London, Stourbridge, and Whittington in England, and Waterford in Ireland.

It was not until the Nineteenth Century that lighthouse and optical glasses were made. Then came the machinery era, which took the place of the old glass handcraft. The Glass-Sellers' Company—one of the old city companies—still remains to remind us of the days when glass-making machinery was unknown, and the work was both costly and arduous.

To-day the great centre of glass manufacture in Britain is St. Helen's, Lancashire, whence glass finds its way to most British, and many foreign, homes. It is something no home can be without.

When Statesmen Travel.

HOTEL BILLS ARE HUGE.
SYDNEY, N.S.W.—Senator Pearce attended the Washington Limitation of Armaments Conference as the retail representative. Upon his return he presented a bill of expenses amounting to approximately \$42,500. Some senators thought this was high, but the commonwealth Treasurer, Mr. Bruce, came forward as one with experience of hotel bills in the United States, and declared one could not live in a Washington hotel for \$250 a week unless one had no meals.
