EVERY WORD SPOKEN IN PARLIAMENT IS RECORDED.

Perhaps the least advertised catalogue in the kingdom is the monthly list of publications issued by H. M. Stationery Office.

The system started centuries ago, the idea being that the public ought to have the chance of knowing what its representatives in Parliament were doing. In those days there were practically no newspapers, so Parliament determined to print its own doing in full.

From that time to this the system has continued, and though to-day we have newspapers, the Government's own publications remain the only official report of the nation's conduct of its business.

Besides every word that has been said in Parliament, the nation also prints—and sells at practically cost price—every report officially made on every item of its business. And once a month it issues something like a 32-page catalogue of what it has to offer its reading public.

Very varied is its haul. One little town has a new Gas Order, perhaps allowing the company to raise or lower the price of its gas by some fraction of a penny. For the alteration a Bill was needed, and so the whole affair has to go into print.

There are boiler explosions in half-a-dozen places. Each calls for an inquiry and a report. All the reports are printed, and all are on sale, the prices varying according to the amount of printing required.

For a penny we can read about an Amendment to the Performing Animals Bill, the guaranteeing of a million odd pounds for Wembley.

If you want to read about the scientific aspect of Glasgow's weather it will cost you 10s.

But if, on the other hand, you are only interested to know the latest news about a particular blade of an aeroplane propeller, you can get your pamphlet for 4d.

Hebridean Fishers for British Columbia

VICTORIA, B.C., Sept. 30.—The fishing industry of the west coast of Vancouver Island is expected to undergo important expansion as a result of the programme of the British Columbia government to bring in a large number of Hebridean fishers.

The fishers will probably be located on Barkley Sound, which is at present the centre of the fishing industry of the Vancouver Island west coast. Twenty-five families will be brought out next spring.

Hebrideans have been fishersfolk through many generations, and the Vancouver Island fishers will follow that pursuit. It is the aim of the government to have the industry operated exclusively by white people. Many Orientals now are engaged.

Finds Her Knight in Reporters Guise

Toronto, Ont., Oct. 9 (By Canadian Press).—Marion Columbia Sanderson, of Buffalo, was wooed and won by a newspaper reporter who turned out at the last moment to be an English Baronet, Sir Ralph McKinnon Turner. Sir Ralph was more or less enjoying the experiences of a reporter on the "Buffalo Evening Post" when he met "Miss Sanderson" and "sort of fell in love, you know," he said, "she concealed her disappointment very well." That he was Lord Turner was not revealed until Sir Ralph asked her father's consent to the marriage. Lord and Lady Turner expect to go to England soon.

Storm Felt in Bay de Verde District

CULVERT SWEEPED AWAY AND FISH-
ING PROPERTY DESTROYED.

According to a message received by Messrs Cramm and Puddister yesterday afternoon from Lower Island Cove, the storm of Thursday night played havoc with stages, fishing boats and other property in the Bay de Verde District. As a result of the torrential rain storm the flow of water was very heavy at Job's Cove, causing considerable damage to the culvert underneath the railway trestle. The estimated loss is said to be over \$2,000. The management of the railway also received a similar message, stating that the culvert, measuring twelve feet deep, and sixty feet long, had been completely swept away. On receipt of this information the railway management made arrangements to have a train sent from Carbonara to the scene with the necessary timber and other appliances to crib it up. It is expected that repairs to the culvert will be completed by this afternoon, when the train from Carbonara will be permitted to proceed. At Carbonara on the Bonavista Bay branch water swept over the railway tracks but no damage was done. The train left Bonavista at 7 o'clock this morning making good headway.

Eskimo Slayer of New- foundland Released

WINNIPEG, Man., Sept. 30.—Noo-Ked-Lah, primitive slayer of the Northland, has been returned to his Igloo.
He was recently released from Stony Mountain penitentiary, because his health was impaired by the climate here, and because it was considered he had erred through savage instinct rather than criminal intent. That there was great rejoicing in his homeland upon his return, is the word received by officials in his homeland.
Noo-Ked-Lah was sentenced to 10 years in prison for killing a Newfoundland trapper at Pond's Inlet, Labrador, in 1920. He was freed last July and taken to Quebec. He sailed with Capt. Bernier on the Arctic.

Sagona Arrives From North

S.S. Sagona, Capt. Day, which went north to relieve S.S. Home at Lewisporte, but was later ordered to Twillingate to bring the Prospero's passenger's south arrived in port at 8 o'clock this morning. The Sagona landed a number of passengers for points in Bonavista and Trinity Bay. On Thursday a storm from the N.N.E. came on, which later increased to a hurricane, and the ship was compelled to remain at Trinity over night. Continuing the trip the ship was again obliged to shelter at Hr. Grace. She sails again at 4 o'clock this afternoon for Lewisporte direct, when she will relieve the Home to take up the Humboldt-Battle Hr. service.

The Newfoundland Hotel, name which will probably be adopted—is progressing favourably. It is hoped before winter sets in to be roofed over. During the month many publicity agents have been in the city and all have been enthusiastic on the tourist possibilities in the island. Already agencies to ascertain what accommodation will be available next year, and the fact that in their inquiries the number of travellers booked is in one case, 500, in another, 1000, is said to indicate the influx of tourists once the country's attractions are properly advertised.
Bookings for accommodation stores in the Hotel and for rooms both locally and from abroad are constantly being received. The Hotel when in running order will prove a great boon to the island with such commodities as early tables, eggs and milk to dispose of and the question is whether the supply will be equal to the demand.
Schooner Cecil, Jr., arrived at Harbor Grace this forenoon. Vessel has been on dock there for haul.
