BY ATLANTIC CABLE.

London, March 9th—There has been as general change in the Turkish Cabinet. All the ministers have resigned except the Grand Vizier.

Paris, March 9—In the Corps Legislatif to-day, the debate on the bill for the regulation of the public press was closed and bill, as amended, was passed with a remarkable unanimity, the vote standing 3t2 to 1.

The Ministerial budget for the ansuing fiscal year ending in 1869, was laid before the Corps Legislatif to-day. The following are the totals of receipts and expenditures as estimated by M. Magne, Minister of Finance: Receipts from ordinary sources, 1,999,000,000 francs; receipts from extraordinary sources, 98 million francs; total estimated receipts, 1,792,000,000f. Expenditures ordinary, 181,000,000f. Extinary fluid francs; extraordinary, 184,000,000; that estimated expenditures, 1,811,000,000f.

New York, Mar. 10—Herald's Havana special says the plantations in the jurisdiction of Bema are on fire. The Spanish man-of-war Africa, at St. Thomas, will seize the American ship Alice Ball, even if her papers show her to be bound for New York.

New York, March 10th—The Herald's City of Mexico special, Feb. 28th, says the news from Sinaloa was very warlike. The rival claimants were about to settle their dispute by battle. A Railroad company to connect the capital with Tuxplan is said to have been formed in New York with a capital of \$25,000,000. They are to commence work forffwith. Nothing new has taken place with reference to the Mexico and Vera Cruz railway since the yote by which the concession was suspended. It is generally hoped that Congress will allow its completion, as this is imperative for the trade of the country. Senor Romero finds many difficulties in his new position of Treasurer. It is quite probable that the foreigners who had a hand in the late conspiracy to assassinate Juarez will be expelled. Banditti are extending their operations despite the energy of the authorities to put them down.
