POLITE DUELING.—A Paris correspondent recently writes: Duels are at all times as plentiful as blackberries in France, in Paris particularly. On Saturday last a meeting took place in the Bois de Boulogne to make amends for the following:—M. Boiron, a student, was dining with his friends, and at another table sat an ex-navy officer, M. Leullier, who, declining to cease throwing sheets of paper at the fair creature, received a box in the face. Cards were exchanged. Great was the surprise of Boiron to see Leullier arrive without his seconds—the latter had missed the train—but he had brought the swords, as did also his antagonist, whose weapons he proposed to select, and in the meantime asked Boiron to accept a cigar, which he did, and to lend him a second. Cigars smoked, business commenced. For ten minutes the combat endured; but "no blood was drawn." Leullier having politely asked his opponent where he would prefer to be "plucked" received no reply. One, two, three parries of the sword, and Boiron was penetrated full in the breast—the sword entering up to the hilt. He is not expected to recover.

OTTAWA NEWS.—The Dominion Parliament is further prorogued until the 7th of December. The Hon. Chas. Fisher is gazetted Judge of the Court of Divorce and Matrimonial cases for the Province of New Brunswick. The Collector of Customs for Toronto has not yet been gazetted, nor have any judicial appointments for Ontario.

The house of a German, about two miles from Ottawa, was burnt on Wednesday morning last, while the owner and his wife were absent. Two children that had been left in bed perished in the flames.

CANADIAN KNIGHTS.—The *Colonial Mail* advocates the creation of a Canadian Order of Knighthood, to be called "The Order of the Knights of St. Lawrence" or of the "North Star." The *Mail* thinks the new distinction would be eagerly sought for, and that the distribution of a few Stars and Baronetries in Nova Scotia would allay the ferment in that Province.

A few nights ago two young men named respectively Helmut and Yack, of Tavistock County, Perth, were out "coon hunting" by the light of a lantern. A coon was treed and Helmut cut the tree down, Yack going forward with the lantern beyond reach of the top; but it brought another down in its fall, the branches of which almost buried the unfortunate Yack, killing him instantaneously.

During the absence of Mr. Donnelly, station-master at Caledonia, the passenger station caught fire from the stove and was burnt to the ground, destroying the books and telegraphic apparatus. Loss to the company \$250.

THE WAY IT IS DONE IN THE STATES.—The *Ottawa Times* says:—We were informed yesterday by an unsophisticated Britisher, evidently unacquainted with the manners and customs prevailing in Uncle Sam's dominions, that whilst travelling in the western regions of said dominions, last week, he heard a man in the ears shout "Grant and Colfax," when another shouted "Seymour and Blair," each thus signifying the political party to which he belonged. The Grant and Colfax man thereupon cried out, "You are a traitor," or "they are traitors." Then without more ado a Seymour and Blair man stepped up and shot the Grant man on the spot, the ball taking effect in the shoulder. That was all. The wounded man was taken off to get his wound dressed. Nobody was arrested. The cars went on, and so did the Presidential campaign.
