Leamington's Sunday Fire.



MR. MONK BANQUETED. We Will Raise Our Tariff Against All Those Who Baise Theirs Against Us," He Says.

Montreal, Nov. 19 .- The banquet Montreal, Nov. 19.—The banquet given at the Queen's last evening to Mr. F. D. Monk, M.P., Quebec lead-er, was a magnificent success, and the ovation which greeted the member for Jacques Cartier was certainly indicative of the representative following that is ranging itself be-hind Mr. Borden's lieutenant.

Mr. Monk's speech was a powerful effort. He referred to the talk of Imperialism in a constitutional man-ner. He believed the colonies and the mother country both desired the statu quo, and said that no one dreamed of Canadian representation dreamed of Canadian representation at Westminster, except Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Tarte.

Speaking of the contingent, he said that although Parliament had sub-sequently ratified the act of the Minister in sending troops to South Africa, it would be better in the future to have the order come from the peo-ple through their Parliament. Mr. Monk was loudly cheered when he said: "We will raise our tariff against all those who raise theirs against us."

Exorbitant Freight Rates.

Ottawa, Nov. 19 .- The extraordinary freight rates which are charged on the White Pass Railway is by all Yukoners to be a great draw-back to the development of that mining region. The Minister of the

The Minister of the Interior has been making an unoffi-cial enquiry into the complaints that have been made from time to time, and has laid the whole matter be-fore the Minister of Railways. In one case it is said that \$1,100 freight was charged on a carload of nails from Skagway to Dawson, a distance of 58 miles. 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




