Amalgamation or No Water Supply

The Legal Aspect of the Question Dis-

To the Editor of the ADVERTISER: As Mr. Hutchinson's recent letters to the ocal press on the subject of a water supply thereon, may lead some of the citizens of London South astray, I must crave an opportunity to put the facts of the case fairly before the public. In doing so, it

intended to furnish an independent water supply:

Section 480 of the Municipal Act provides that every municipal council shall have power to contract with any water company for a supply of water within the municipality for fire purposes and other public uses from hydrants or otherwise, as may be deemed advisable, and for renting such hydrants for any number of years, not in the first instance exceeding ten, and for renewing such contract from time to time for such period not exceeding ten years as the Council may desire.

And under sub-sec. 2 of the sec. 17 (commonly known as the Badgerow Act):

All the powers given to the council of every township by this act shall remain in force as respects the portion of the township so set apart, and are hereby continued and extended to the council of every township wherein the portion thereof is so set apart.
