DOUBLE CENTURY RECORD REDUCED.
BUFFALO, N. Y., Oct. 1.—The American double century record was lowered again yesterday by W. L. Steimal, of the Ramblers, from 15 hours, 50 minutes and 30 seconds, to 13 hours, 21 minutes and 30 seconds. He made the last 100 miles in 6 hours and 41 minutes.

DISASTROUS RAILWAY WRECK.

Five Persons Killed and Several Seriously Injured.

WOODSTOCK, Ill., Oct. 1.—At 3:30 o'clock this morning a freight train bound for Chicago was wrecked on the Chicago and Northwestern Railway at Grover's Crossing, about a mile west of this city.

When the wrecking crew reached the spot the voice of a man was heard calling for help. His hand protruded from beneath the debris. This wrecked car was loaded with green planks, and the lumber was removed as rapidly as possible, the result being the discovery of five dead bodies, one badly injured, and a boy seriously bruised and shaken up. The dead are:

Bert Little, Freeport, Ill.; Tyrrell Davis, Mount Morris, Ill.; two unknown boys and an unknown man, said to be known as "Milwaukee Eddie."

The injured are: Joseph Grady, Fall River, Mass., leg broken, back injured and left wrist chewed by one of the boys in his death struggle, the latter lying with his head pinned by the lumber to Grady's breast; Sam Newman, 12 years old, Freeport, Ill.

METHODIST MISSIONS.

Grants to the Different Departments—Dr. Sutherland's Substantial Contribution.

Toronto, Oct. 1.—The official report of proceedings at the recent meeting in this city of the Methodist Mission Board is about to be issued. The grants to the different departments were as follows: Domestic missions, \$83,009; Japan work, \$21,725; West China, \$7,374; Indian missions in Canada, \$55,159; Chinese work in British Columbia, \$5,014; French missions, \$8,058; miscellaneous, \$32,775; total, \$233,114. Rev. Dr. John Shaw was continued as assistant secretary.

When the salary of the general secretary was under consideration the board promptly voted the usual amount, \$2,500. In acknowledging this action Dr. Sutherland said that as this was a year of stringency, when there must be a reduction all round, he proposed to return \$500 of the amount voted by the board. The announcement was received with evidences of lively satisfaction.

The Reason Why

The Street Railway Company Decline the Council's Terms

In Regard to Substituting Electricity for Horse Power.

A New Industry for London—Victoria Bridge to be Japanned.

The City Council meetings appear, like the days, to grow shorter towards the end of the year. Last night's meeting, which was over at 10:30, was principally devoted to placing correspondence and appointing it to the various committees. A full board was present, with the exception of Ald. John Heaman.

THE REASON WHY.

Mr. H. A. Everett, of the London Street Railway Company, wrote as follows:

We beg to acknowledge receipt of your favor of 18th inst. calling for specific response to your amendments to our proposition of 25th of July last, and would respectfully state that, among other serious objections to the proposed amendments, some of the leading objections are as follows:

1. As to routes: As we have always said, we do not think there need be any difficulty as to the final adjustment of this matter, although in the routes at present indicated by your honorable body, several streets could not be made to pay operating expenses let alone interest charges, and, besides, even if we were willing to undertake some of them we fear legislative sanction could not be obtained.

2. Sections 7 and 8, dealing particularly with the termination of the franchise, cannot be accepted by the company, as they would entail burdens possibly in the last year of the franchise which would make the property valueless, and this contingency hanging over the entire 31 years would make the present worth nil, owing to the burdens which might be placed upon the property near the expiration of the franchise.

3. Section 9 cannot be accepted by the company, and in we think, unreasonable.

4. Sections 12 and 13 appear to be very unreasonable, inasmuch as the bridges of the city are free for the use of all loaded vehicles coming to the city from any outside point, but by your amended proposition as submitted would be made toll bridges for the most modern use of the highway by citizens. The life of the bridges will not be affected, as vehicular traffic will not be so great, owing to the number of persons patronizing the street railway.

5. In regard to clause 14 of the amendments, there appear to be legal obstacles at present in the way to prevent the construction of a line to Springbank as proposed by you.

6. In reference to paragraph 16 of your proposal. We do not fully understand the import of this, but think in any agreement that is framed in reference thereto our existing rights and contracts should be specifically protected.

As we said before, these are some of the most prominent objections to your amended proposition as submitted, and if you think they can be overcome we shall be pleased to have a conference at any time for further consideration.

A NEW INDUSTRY.

Mr. John McClary addressed the council in support of a request for street privileges on York street. He wished permission to sink a pipe under the surface of the street and to lay a tram track across. The pipe is to lead liquid fuel from the adjoining tracks, and the tram railway to carry coal across on. Mr. McClary stated that he proposed to erect a building 60x100 feet in order to commence the manufacture of granite ware. It was an expensive undertaking, and would be of much benefit to the city. The council granted the petition, the work to be done to the satisfaction of the city engineer.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

No. 3 had no report.

The proposition to "japan" York street bridge and Victoria bridge for \$125 each evoked a speech from each member of the council. Messrs. Pritchard and Taylor objected to the work because the paint was made in the United States. The balance of the council hesitated between the expense of the work and the necessity. Ald. F. J. Fitzgerald said that the bridge could be painted for much less. As a compromise Victoria bridge only will be japanned.

No. 1 committee's report went through unaltered and without discussion.

OTHER BUSINESS.

In reply to an enquiry the mayor detailed his visit to the Deep Waterways Convention in Toronto. Ald. O'Meara moved that an artificial stone walk be laid down in front of St. Paul's cathedral, the city to bear the cost. His motion was not seconded. Ald. J. W. Jones moved that the city engineer ascertain the cost of laying two blocks of Dundas street with vitrified brick. Ald. Coe seconded. Carried.

Ald. Coe pressed his notice of motion to change what remained of the cedar block assessment on Dundas street against the general taxation to allow a new pavement to be put down. After a half hour's discussion the motion was referred to No. 2 committee to be dealt with. Ald. Pritchard gave notice of motion to allow the London Street Railway Company to extend their electric line from London West over Kensington bridge and operate the same on payment of a license of \$50 a car.

The bylaw under which the city will pay one-third of the cost of the artificial stone walk of the city was brought up for a third reading, but after a lengthy discussion the third reading was postponed until

the next meeting to allow of further information being got. A bylaw to more evenly divide the polling subdivisions of ward 5 was read the usual number of times and carried. The council then adjourned.
