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Their Fate Back.

Retreat of the Greek Army From Arta.

Indications That the Struggle Must Soon Cease.

The Greek Legislature Get Together at Last.

Ralli's Proposals - The Deposed Premier Promises the Cooperation of His Party-No Intervention by the Powers.

London, May 3.-A special from Athens announces that the Greek army in Epirus has retreated in thorough order to Arta, where it is awaiting reinforcements. The dispatch adds that M. Ralli has announced his intention of calling to arms every able-bodied man in Greece.

The Turks are preparing to besiege Arta. The streets of Arta present a strange scene, with the continuous exodus of citizens and the steady incoming of the peasantry, who camp out in the streets around fires, with thousands of sheep and cattle.

Capt. Rabbeek, of King George's personal staff, wired to London from Athens Saturday that the right wing of the Greek army had repulsed the Turks, but that the left wing had retreated behind the old frontier line to avoid being encircled.

A HOPELESS STRUGGLE. Capt. Rabbeek adds: "The Greek army in Epirus, after defeat at Pontepagadia, has retreated to Arta. All hope of continuing the war is now virtually abandoned. The fleet has returned to Volo for the protection of the inhabitants."

Private advices from Constantinople say that immense misery and loss have been caused by the war to the Greek residents in Turkey, hundreds of whom are prosperous merchants, traders and shop-keepers. Greek capitalists in Salonica and Smyrna have been ruined, and only the interrupted success of the Turkish arms, which has kept the Mussulmans from advancing, has prevented wholesale pillage and massacre in those cities.

Telegram from Athens state that the new Ministry acknowledges that it will be impossible for Greece to continue the war with an empty purse and with discouraged troops.

DELYANNIS' HAND FORCED. M. Delannais has made a statement to the effect that he did not favor a war with Turkey, but was afraid of the consequences. He says that he was compelled to espouse a war policy in order to save the dynasty.

THE PANIC AT PENTEPAGADIA. London, May 3.-The Times correspondent at Patras, giving details of the fighting at Pentepagadia, says that the officers to provide for the timely arrival of reinforcements, a matter so difficult in that wild section of the country, and that the Greek army, which had been fighting for several days, had been driven back to the old frontier line.

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Panic in Brita.

All the Stores Closed and the Greek Troops Leaving.

The Turks Occupy the Bridge at Louros.

Athens, May 3.-Advices from Arta say that from local authorities and about a hundred inhabitants of that place have returned there. Panic, however, still prevails at Arta. All the stores are closed, and the military authorities are said to be contemplating a further withdrawal of the Greek troops in that vicinity.

In the direction of Filiplada, flames are visible. An armed Greek priest has been attempting to restore the morale of the troops at Arta by preaching a crusade against the Turks in the public square.

Athens, May 3.-The Minister of War and Marine has left Pharsa for Athens, after a long conference with Prince Constantine and the headquarters of the army.

Athens, May 3.-A dispatch from Arta says that the Turks have occupied the bridge at Louros.

FRENCH TABOOED. Berlin, May 3.-The French language is now finally forbidden to be used in Alsace Lorraine in public speeches, and several meetings have been dissolved upon that account. The matter will be raised in the Reichstag, it being claimed that the prohibition is illegal.

OSCAR RELEASED. London, May 3.-Oscar Wilde was released from Portland prison on Saturday. He is in excellent health. He has been employed lately in book-binding in the morning and garden work in the afternoon, and is quite recovered from the shaken condition of a year ago. It is understood that he will go to Italy.

TAMPED WITH THE KAISER'S ENGINE. Berlin, May 3.-It transpired that during the recent trip of Emperor William to Dresden, the Imperial train was stopped en route for fully two hours owing to the train gear being broken. The engineer discovered the gear had been tampered with, and that there would have been a serious accident if it had passed unnoticed.

MAY DAY. London, May 3.-In London May Day passed quietly. The Social Democratic Federation and other societies made a demonstration in Hyde Park during the afternoon. A feature of the celebration was the prominence of children, one platform in the park being occupied by children. A children's choir sang "England, Arise."
