DRITISH GFISION.

LONDON, Nov. 12—The Daily Telegraph this morning publishes a number of interviews on the result of the American election with representatives of various trade interests of Great Britain. The president and secretary of the Sheffield Chamber of Commerce and the heads of various firms in that city are represented as being pleased at Mr. Cleveland's victory but not sanguine of any immediate result in the way of tariff reform. In one interview an exmaster cutler, named Richardson, is quoted as saying that he thinks that if any reduction is made it will be for selfish reasons, and will only benefit America. A number of interviews had in Liverpool made it apparent that keen interest is evinced there in the result, and it has been the chief topic of discussion in the cotton market, on the stock exchange, and among the frequenters of other businoss centers of that city. The opinions expressed are various. Liverpool shipowners especially, think the result will be of great benefit to them. ous.
