Advices from Cape Town announce that Gen. Sir George Stewart White, V. C., who will command the British forces in Natal, proceeds to Durban at once. On his arrival at Cape Town he found the situation on the Natal border so grave that he wired for immediate transportation for himself and staff to Durban, and the British second-class cruiser Forte was placed at

his disposal. A special dispatch from Johannesburg says the Boer officials there continue to urge the British subjects who remain to leave. Orders have been issued from Pre-

toria, closing all the saloons in the gold fields. The Transvaal Government has taken over the Ferreir's mines, and all the mines in the gold fields. A group of five of the Eckstein mines have been closed. Additional transports, with troops from India, arrived yesterday at Dur-ban, Natal, and will proceed to the

front immediately.

A dispatch from Volksrust says the Boer camp on the Natal border now comprises 8,000 men, and is growing daily. The camp breathes with outrageous fervor.
