The Boers Advancing The Health of the Hair

Their Artillery Moving Toward the Natal Frontier

And Are Said to Have Occupied Laing's Neck.

Inhabitants of Newcastle Will Not Defend the Town.

Seizure of Gold by the Boers Regarded as an Act of War-British Liberal Members Will Support the Government.

London, Oct. 5.-A special from New-
castle, Natal, says: The Boers have left the laager at Volksrust, and are moving towards the frontier. The situation is most critical. The magistrates and municipal officers have assembled in the town hall to concert measures for the defense of the town against an unexpected attack. All the women and children have been ordered to leave for the interior of Natal. The British cruiser Philis has arrived in the harbor of Durban, Natal.

The Daily Telegraph publishes in its second edition this morning a dispatch from Newcastle, Natal, dated yesterday, announcing that Boer advance began yesterday, with a general movement of artillery.

The dispatch continues: "The Boers are occupying Laing's Neck, and hold the mountains to the southwest of Volksrust. There are no British troops nearer than Laingsmith, and preparations are being made to abandon Natal from the frontier to Grahamstown."

The Boers are said to have met today and decided not to attempt to defeat the town in the event of a Boer advance in force. Gen. Symons is preparing to evacuate within 24 hours. The people are crowding the trains for Laingsmith.

London, Thursday, Oct. 5.-A dispatch from Bloemfontein says: "The Free State Government publishes a statement from Buisson stating that the British forces have crossed the border, and that fighting has commenced. Another telegram says that troops have crossed the border, but that no fighting has yet occurred. The government discredits the report."

Other telegrams represent that a Boer attack upon Natal is expected at any moment, but assert that Commandant Gen. Joubert has threatened to shoot any man who moves without orders.

The London morning papers are inclined to regard the seizure of gold by the Transvaal Government as an act of war.

No absolute confirmation is obtainable that a Boer ultimatum has been presented, but the news comes from good sources.

Although today's news from South Africa is unmistakably grave, the advocates of peace still derive a glimpse of hope from some of the dispatches which are a strangely garbled mass of uncorroborated numbers. Thousands of the burghers are so attired that it is difficult to distinguish them from British troops.

Last Friday the British Government arrived at the conclusion that the real danger of a Boer attack lies on the Natal side, and thousands of men who have been landed on the Rhodesia and Delagoa Bay have been sent and dispatched toward the north and south.

Commandant-General Joubert has issued a proclamation threatening to shoot any man who crosses the border.

PARLIAMENT TO MEET OCT. 17.

Parliament has been summoned to meet on Oct. 17. Relations with the Transvaal and the immediate requirements of the war department in case of hostilities will, no doubt, be the main subjects for consideration.

Parliamentary business, even at the dispatch drawn up by the cabinet on Thursday was still unsent last evening.
