### THE SMALLPOX

Three Cases in Winnipeg Quarantine Hospital—More Cases in Ontario.

Toronto, Feb. 18.—A number of cases of smallpox were reported today to Dr. Bryce, among the centers being Whitney, Moore, Kent and Southam. There are three cases in Harwich and two in the latter place. In Cambridge Township six cases are reported, while 21 cases have already occurred in Castlemaine village. Ten cases have occurred in two families in Bruce township, and in Kincardine township 25 have been reported in five families. The outbreak at Brantford and Parry Sound has been cleaned up.  
Winnipeg, Feb. 18.—A man named Wm. Wardrop, quarantined in the Windsor Hotel for the last few days, was found to be suffering from a mild case of smallpox this morning. He was removed to the quarantine. There are now three persons in the civic quarantine hospital.

### A.O.U.W. GRAND LODGE

In Session at Toronto—Encouraging Report From the Grand Recorder.

Toronto, Ont., Feb. 18.—The executive committee of the Grand Lodge of the A. O. U. W. met here to prepare the work of the session of grand lodge, which begins tomorrow. The proposed amendments to the constitution, which are to come up before the grand lodge, caused a spirited discussion.  
The grand recorder's report was received with satisfaction, the year 1901 holding the record for growth, as 4,848 new members were admitted to the order. Twenty new lodges were organized, making 49 lodges in Ontario in good standing; 42,552 certificates in good standing; 346 members died in 1901, at an average age of 51 years, 8 months and 1 week; \$32,000 were paid out last year for death claims; balance to the credit of beneficiary fund, \$7,536.23. Receipts of general fund, \$49,110.52; expenditure, \$48,915.87; amount of reserve fund, \$225,345.69; total claims paid since organization, \$8,839,106.54. The death rate has been 8.13 per 1,000. There were 5,159 applications accepted and 300 rejected.  
The executive committee strongly endorsed the proposal to translate the ritual into French, and to provide suitable literature on the work of the order, and translate it for the purpose of obtaining a membership in Quebec.

200 and 300 delegates from all parts of Ontario, Brant and Norfolk counties, were in attendance here today at the Grand Lodge of Instruction for Wilson district, No. 6. The big gathering was conducted tonight by a grand banquet in the city hall.

### LEGISLATURE NOTES

Registry Inspector's Report—Gross Amount of Fees Earned Over \$186,000—Demand Industrial Education.

Toronto, Feb. 18.—The agricultural department of the government does not favor the idea of appointing special instructors to lecture on beet sugar, or ordering present instructors to do so, at all meetings throughout the province. The department holds that special lectures should only be given in those sections where a sugar factory is assured, or where manufacturers have made contracts with the farmers for a supply of beets.

BRUCE MINES RAILWAY.  
Engineer McCallum, of the public works department, has returned from an inspection of the Bruce Mines and Algoma Railway, which is running from Bruce Mines to Rock Lake, in Aberdeen township. The line is now within one-half mile of the copper concentrating mill, and the policy of the engineer was informed that during the summer months a smelting furnace will be erected alongside the concentrator.

NEGLECTED CHILDREN.  
The annual report of the neglected and dependent children's department shows that 240 children were provided with foster homes last year, and six were removed from homes not considered suitable for them. Some 1,100 orphans were sent to Canada from England during the year, and the officer who has charge of this department says they were of a better class than formerly because greater care was exercised in their selection. The report says that the demand for children was greater than the supply.

REGISTRY OFFICES' REPORT.  
The report of the registry offices' inspector shows that the fees in Toronto East, for which Mr. Ryan is registrar, totalled \$5,633.90, with mortgages registered aggregating \$3,332,410. The other figures for Toronto and York are: Toronto West, Charles Lindsey Registrar, fees \$9,550.15, mortgages aggregating \$2,060,189; York East and West, James Massie, registrar, fees \$5,216.99, and in York North, J. T. Pearson, registrar, \$1,800.75. The gross amount of fees earned in the province was \$196,295.03, compared with \$184,928.21 in 1900. Instruments registered, 139,193, an increase of 8,552 over 1900, of which 31,437 were mortgages, drawn for amounts aggregating \$40,494,929.69.

### AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION.

The demand for industrial education is becoming so great that the Agricultural College at Guelph is filled to its capacity, over 600 students having registered during the two months ending Feb. 1, 1902. The Western Dairy School, Strathroy, shows even greater growth. Three years ago there were less than a dozen students in attendance, while today fifty-seven young men are there fitting themselves specially for work connected with the dairy, creamery, and cheese business. During the past week Mr. Creelman, superintendent of farmers' institutes, who is director of this school, employed Mrs. Elizabeth Torrance, of Chateauguay Basin, Que., to give practical demonstrations to the farmers' wives and daughters in Middlesex county. Over two hundred ladies have taken advantage of the opportunity so offered to receive instruction in methods pertaining to home life and work.

### THE ONTARIO LEGISLATURE

Gives Numerous Bills Their Third Reading.

Conservative Proposal to Reduce the Membership to Sixty—Notice Given of a Government Redistribution Bill.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Toronto, Feb. 18.—To judge by the crowds in the legislative galleries yesterday it was evident that many people expected that the prohibition measure would be on the afternoon programme. The business, however, was entirely routine, and the visitors melted rapidly away as the day wore on and they began to see that the subject in which they were interested would not come up.

Among the bills introduced was an amendment introduced by Mr. Thompson to the act respecting the office of sheriff, a bill by Mr. Colquhoun, respecting the Hamilton Radial Railway Company; an amendment to the toll roads expropriation act, by Mr. Dickenson, and a bill by Mr. Jamieson respecting the representation in the Legislative Assembly.

### THIRD READINGS.

A third reading was given Mr. Preston's bill to incorporate the Brantford Young Women's Christian Association; Mr. Lumsden's bill respecting the Presbyterian Ladies' College at Ottawa; a bill by Mr. Farde respecting the village of Point Edward, and one by Mr. Whitney to incorporate the Morrisburg Electric Railway Company.

### POWER FROM NIAGARA.

Premier Ross, in moving the second reading of the bill to confirm an agreement respecting the Victoria, Niagara Falls Park, stated that on July 1, 1904, the Canadian Power Company would be in a position to supply electric energy to the extent of 20,000 horse-power. The contracts executed and the amount expended so far by the company totalled \$1,700,000. The larger part of the work had been contracted for with Canadians.

Mr. Hay complained that the bill contained nothing regarding price, but the premier pointed out that there was a stipulation providing that half the energy generated should be furnished Canadian consumers, and that the prices should be the same as those of American consumers. It was clearly impossible, he declared, that any more definite should be decided upon when it was considered that the price might vary within a very few years.

Hon. J. M. Gibson's bill to further amend the devolution of estates act, and Hon. J. T. Garrow's bill respecting expert witnesses were reported from committee.

A second reading was given Hon. Richard Harcourt's bill to amend the separate schools act.

The attorney-general's bill to divide the district of Rainy River for the registration of wills and deeds was also given a second reading.

Mr. Jamieson (Conservative, South Grey) introduced a bill to reduce the number of members in the Legislative Assembly to 60, the boundaries of the electoral districts to be determined in 1905, and in every tenth year hereafter, by three commissioners chosen by the lieutenant-governor in council, to divide the province among themselves.

### IN SUPPLY.

When the house went into committee of supply a great many questions were asked of Hon. J. B. Straton, provincial secretary, by the opposition members. Mr. Straton said that the masonry and carpentry of the new infirmary at the police hospital had been completed, and he expected it would be ready during the coming season. He explained that inmate labor had been employed as much as possible in the building of the infirmary. The minister said in regard to the increases in the salaries of attendants and supervisors that this was the policy he had adopted of a fixed scale of salaries for every institution to do away with the annoyance of being annually petitioned for increases of attendants and supervisors. Supervisors would start at \$24, while attendants would start at \$18.
