Manufacturers' Day at The Western Fair Had Largest Tuesday's Attendance Seen in Years.

Patrons and Promoters Alike Well Pleased.

EVERYTHING WORKS SMOOTHLY

Visitors Wear Smiles That Won't Come Off—Immense Crowds Arriving Today.

Yesterday was manufacturers' day at the fair. It was the second day of Canada's greatest live stock and agricultural exhibition, and on the part of the directors there was only one desire that remained unfulfilled. It was for a crowd twice, aye, three times, as large as that which passed through the turnstiles. A regular Farmers' Day at-

tendance, such as is seen today, would have delighted the management as nothing else could. But the directors were too modest to look for such things. Therefore disappointment was not their lot.

The day could not have been exceeded, so far as the weather was concerned. The compiler of the forecasts had mentioned something about "cool" with rain, but it was quite apparent that the intelligence must have come to London by mistake, for it was neither cooler than Monday, nor was there any rain, although at times the sky was a trifle cloudy. However there was no protest because of the error, by Old Probs, the wish of the directors being that he might make more errors of the same kind during the remainder of the week.

Yesterday's attendance was gratifying in the extreme. While no figures were given out for publication, it was stated that there was no cause for complaint. On the contrary there was every cause for satisfaction, as Tuesday day of the fair of 1902 had at least been surpassed. Secretary Nelson went further than that, for he ventured the statement that it was the best Tuesday the fair had experienced in some years. The rush in the evening was what astonished the directors. The people came in such crowds for a time that the gate ticket sellers were unable to keep up with the rush, while at the grand stand the ticket men found even greater difficulty, for they had to handle the crowd that had been in the grounds all day, as well as those who were just pouring in.

"I never saw such a Tuesday before," said W. M. Spencer, chairman of the gates and tickets committee, at the close of the evening performance. It was the first day of the excursions from outside points, and this was responsible for the presence of several thousand persons who might not, with regular rates in force, have been found in London. The Grand Trunk, naturally, carried the major portion of the excursionists, for it had no less than five special trains from Sarnia, Stratford, Chatham, Windsor and Jarvis, the last of them reaching here before 10 o'clock in the morning, thus giving visitors a long day at the fair. The L. E. and D. K. R. had a good share of business, and the C. P. R. and M. C. R. had extra coaches on every train.

Yesterday was an uneventful day on the grounds. There were the attractions, speed trials and fireworks, and the sight-seeing in the various departments. The lightness of the exhibits in the second floor of the main building has been commented upon by the directors, and it is understood a move will be made to bring about some changes before another fair rolls around. The absence of London manufacturers is one of the main causes for regret, and a great effort will be put forth to have them show, as they did in the earlier years of the fair. FINDS \$13,000 IN OLD WRECK

A Nova Scotia Fisherman Purchases a Treasure Ship for Twenty-One Shillings.

Digby, N. S., Sept. 16.—By the aid of a diver Thomas Burns, a fisherman, of Seaview, N. S., has recovered nearly \$13,000 in gold from the hull of a wrecked vessel, for which he had paid 21 shillings, and he expects to find even more treasure. The wreck was that of a big lost a mile below Cortreville seventy years ago. She is said to have been the Barbic, lost on her way home after a three years' trading cruise in South America. It was said that her commander and his son had for the owners \$50,000 in gold, the profits of the trip. Burns bought the hull for the copper nails and fastenings. A diver who was exploring other wrecks was engaged to look into this one. Most of the gold coin is Spanish. One piece bears the date 1821 and is stamped "Republica del Colombia." Others are dated 1817.

DISLIKES THE HOTELS THAT INDIANA AIRSHIP

Wealthy Irishman Takes Up Quarters in a Workhouse.

Dublin, Sept. 16.—At the weekly meeting of the Donegal Board of Guardians a man named McCreary, who said he had returned to Ireland after making a fortune in America, applied for admission to the workhouse as a paying boarder, on the ground that he found the hotels in the northwest of Ireland not to his liking. The application was granted, and McCreary drove to the workhouse in a carriage and pair. He pays \$5 25 per week for his board.

Cotton Mills Reopen.

Lawrence, Mass., Sept. 16.—It is announced at the Pemberton cotton mills here that the plant will be started in full on Wednesday next. The mills have been closed three weeks on account of shortage in cotton. The Methuen mills in Methuen, which have been shut down for a similar period and for the same reason, will also resume on Monday.

"Worthy of Children."

London, Sept. 16.—Edwin Cannan, reading a paper before the British Association on "What is Success in Foreign Trade," said the idea of an interrupted supply of food from Canada in case of war with the United States was only worthy of children who had not reached the map of the western hemisphere.

Will Not Resign.

London, Sept. 16.—The Times thinks there is no doubt that Premier Balfour will meet Parliament and defend the policy embodied in his pamphlet. Even should there be, as rumored, one or two ministerial resignations, it is unlikely that there will arise any question of the resignation of the Government or an appeal to the country.

DEVEY DEFEATED

"Big Bill" Turned Down by New York Democrats.

New York, Sept. 16.—The primaries, both Republican and Democratic, yesterday passed off much more smoothly than had been expected. The closeness of some of the district fights was remarkable. This was true in four of the Democratic fights. They were the first district, where Daniel E. Finn had to fight for victory against Ald. Michael McKenney, and the ninth district, where the hottest fight in the city was waged unsuccessfully by William S. Devey against Frank J. Goodwin, who won by 404 votes.

And Absorb the Country—Torture of Politicals at Monastir—Situation at Beirut.

London, Sept. 16.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Daily Telegraph claims to have the highest diplomatic authority for saying that Russia's Balkan policy is to isolate Bulgaria by refusing to stop the Macedonian massacres, and inducing the powers to remain inactive. Then, when Turkey has defeated Bulgaria, Russia will insist on stepping in and occupying Bulgaria under the pretext of protecting her. This Bulgaria would become Russia's vassal. Minister Witte's removal, continues the correspondent, was due to his advocacy of a peaceful settlement of the Balkan problem. A dispatch from Belgrade, to the Daily Mail asserts that the Serbian Government lately equipped bands, which were sent in military trains to the frontier, where each man was given arms, provisions and \$25 in cash. The Turkish representative has demanded the cessation of this practice. Vienna, Sept. 16.—A Constantinople dispatch asserts that the British embassy is inspecting the action of the Turkish troops in the Adriatic district, which has relations with the injured having been forbidden to continue the journey. It is stated that as far as his observations went they confirmed the reports of the extermination of the Macedonian population by the Turks. A report was published in a Trieste paper that an Austrian squadron had been ordered to keep in readiness to proceed to Salonica. This news is semi-officially denied. It is believed to be substantially correct.

London, Sept. 16.—The correspondent of the Daily Mail at Monastir described the situation of the prisoners they used for political prisoners. They are so low that the inmates cannot even sit; they must lie down. The Turkish authorities have ordered that for three days together, and the passages are stopped and other tortures inflicted in order to force the prisoners into confessions of complicity with the revolutionaries. Many have died under this treatment. Constantinople, Sept. 16.—The Feast of the Cross passed off without disturbance at Beirut. Contrary to the official reports, advices from good sources say that the Macedonian insurgents are holding their own at several points and are inflicting defeats on the Turks, and the districts of Merhoya, Melnik, 65 miles from Salonica, where three Turkish battalions have almost been annihilated. The local authorities at Monastir are seeking to prevent the foreign consuls and correspondents from leaving the town, under the allegation that their lives are endangered. It is said that the Sultan was much annoyed when he learned that Albanian troops had been dispatched to Adrianople.

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CHOLERA AND BUBONIC

Many Deaths From Plague in the Philippines.

Manila, Sept. 16.—One hundred cases of bubonic plague are reported in Tondo, the most thrifty and populous suburban district of this city. Of these 80 have had a fatal termination. Twelve cases, with nine deaths are also reported from Cebu, the province of Visayas. Cholera is prevalent in all parts of the island, the result of an absence of rain.

MAXIME ELLIOTT ILL.

Attended by Three Doctors at Her New York Home.

New York, Sept. 16.—Maxime Elliott, the actress and wife of Nat C. Goodwin, who returned from a summer in England in a very frail condition, is seriously ill at her home in West Eng avenue, and attended by three doctors. Her illness has been interrupted, and it is not certain that the prognosis will take place at the scheduled time.

RUSSIA TURNS TO THE NEAR EAST

Will Permit the Turks to New York Police in Fierce Combat With Toughs.

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BIG FIRE AT "500"

\$300,000 Damage Done to Business Section.

Detroit, Mich., Sept. 16.—The fire which broke out in Sault Ste. Marie last night, and which destroyed several buildings in the business section, was gotten under control about 1 o'clock this morning. It is believed that the damage will amount to about \$300,000.

STRANGLED HER BABY

A Mother's Terrible Deed While She Was Asleep.

Pottsville, Pa., Sept. 16.—Mrs. Alexander Riffin, McAdoo's Coroner A. L. Gillars that she had a dream in which her distorted mind became obsessed with the fact that some one had seized her child and was spiriting it away. In her frenzy she held on to the infant with all her force. When she awoke she found that she had been holding the babe by the throat and had actually strangled it to death. The mother is now held in custody by the police.

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FREE TRADE NOT SACRED DECLARES PREMIER BALFOUR

A Double Life.

New York, Sept. 15.—Supposedly a successful business man, with a comfortable home in Ridgewood, N. J., and a member of the Oddfellows Lodge in that place, but really a dangerous burglar, George Kimard, alias George F. Howard, fell into the hands of the police today after evading them for more than a year. While a respected citizen of Ridgewood as Howard, the prisoner, it is alleged, committed scores of burglaries in as many towns within a radius of 50 miles of his home. Kimard has been living in West Sixty-sixth street for ten months with his wife and their son, Clifford, 14 years old.

THE ANTHRACITE OUTPUT

Over-Production Sends Down Price of Domestic Sizes.

Philadelphia, Sept. 16.—Officials of the Reading and Pennsylvania Railroads say no step has yet been taken toward a curtailment of the output of anthracite and that the matter has not even been considered. It was admitted here by an official of one of the companies that the market for the domestic sizes was practically dead, and that some curtailment of output would have to be made soon. He added that he would not be surprised if the miners were put on four days a week in a short time. Meanwhile independent operators without any storage facilities for their surplus output are said to be cutting the circular prices for the domestic sizes as much as 40 cents per ton, offering the coal for \$3.35 at the mines, as against the circular price of \$3.75.

HONORED MRS. MACKAY

A Farewell Reception at Chalmers Church, Woodstock.

Woodstock, Sept. 16. Monday evening at Chalmers Church a farewell reception was held in honor of Mrs. Mackay, wife of Mr. J. F. Mackay, the newly-appointed business manager of the Globe. Mrs. Mackay has been an active member of the church and for some time past, the president of the Ladies' Aid. On behalf of that organization a highly laudatory address was read by Miss Mabel Dodge, while the presentation of some handsome pieces of china was made by Miss Jessie Mackay. Rev. Dr. Mackay responded briefly in Mrs. Mackay's behalf, expressing her appreciation of the kindness shown her. A musical programme followed the presentation.

A TRAMP'S CONSCIENCE

Returns C. P. R. \$10 for Having Beaten His Way.

Montreal, Sept. 16.—Robert Kerr, passenger traffic manager of the C. P. R., received \$10 yesterday from a former tramp, who is a Dowieite. The letter reads: "I closed my postal note for \$10 to pay for rides which I stole on your trains. I am a tramp, for I was a tramp and hoboed almost from Maine to California, largely on C. P. R. trains. Now I am a Christian, brought to know the love of Jesus. I must pay all my bills. I will pay them all in time. Hoping to get a reply from you. God bless you, Mr. Kerr."

CANADA SCORES THE FIRST POINT

Lord Alverstone Supports Counsel Finlay's Contentions as to Portland Channel.

London, Sept. 15.—The first day of the oral arguments in the Alaskan boundary question was taken up by Attorney-General Finlay, who partially presented the Canadian view of the important controversy. The Canadians were gratified at scoring what they believed to be the first good point. During the afternoon the attorney-general sought to establish the position of Portland Channel and fix the entrance thereto. He interpreted the words, "A la haute mer" in the Russo-British correspondence leading to the signature of the treaty of 1825, not as showing that the boundary lies "on the same parallel" as the lower end of Prince of Wales Island, claimed by the United States, but "off," as asserted by Canada. The effect of this would be to fix the line at 54 degrees 45 minutes, as claimed by Canada. Chief Justice Alverstone agreed with Attorney-General Finlay. When American counsel have the opportunity to speak they say they will show that the Canadians themselves have given various interpretations to the phrase, and they are inclined to minimize the importance of Lord Alverstone's statement.

"SAM" JONES POUNDED

The Fighting Evangelist Whipped by a Postmaster.

Cartersville, Ga., Sept. 16.—The Rev. "Sam" Jones, the fighting Methodist evangelist, who once whipped the Mayor of a Texas town, was badly bruised in a personal encounter with Walter Akerman, postmaster of Cartersville. Mr. Jones, from the pulpit, denounced Mr. Akerman for selling wine, and said: "The people of Cartersville would prefer for President Roosevelt to come the Indiana game on them. They would rather have a sober decent negro to hand them their mail than a dirty dog who uses his official position to violate the law." He also charged that one of the marshals of the town is running a "blind tiger." Mr. Jones and Mr. Akerman met this morning and the fight was on at once. Mr. Jones declared after the fight that his first was the only thing about him, bruised.

Grand Vizier Dismissed.

Paris, Sept. 15.—The foreign office has been informed that the Persian Grand Vizier has been dismissed.

RABID FREE TRADERS, FOOLISH

Empire Cannot Go On as She Is in World of Protection—London Press Comment.

London, Sept. 15.—Premier Balfour issued tonight the advance sheets of a pamphlet on the subject of "Insular free trade," in which he presents at length arguments in favor of a change in Great Britain's fiscal policy. In introducing the pamphlet Mr. Balfour says his purpose in issuing it is that it would be impossible to put all the important points of this question within the limits of a single speech, and, therefore, he says the pamphlet may be a fitting preliminary to the speech which he will shortly make. This undoubtedly refers to the speech Mr. Balfour will make at Sheffield, October 1. Mr. Balfour says he approaches the subject from the standpoint of a free trader as far as contemporary circumstances will permit. He continues: "I am a free trader, but not of the pattern which holds that the doctrine of free trade is so universal in its application that every conclusion to which it logically leads must be accepted without hesitation and without reservation. The arguments presented throughout the pamphlet vary little from those already enunciated, but the Premier points out that as a result of England's policy of retaining a tariff policy made for a free trade country in a world of free traders, not for a free trade country in a world of protectionists, the rate of her export trade has not increased and, in fact, has seriously diminished. Compared with past years, some departments show no increase, while others show symptoms of decay. The Premier asserts that there is no reason to expect an improvement. Meanwhile Germany, America, France, Russia, and even Great Britain's self-governing colonies continue to build up a protected interest within their borders."

FREE TRADERS' MISTAKES.

Mr. Balfour says the mistakes made by the free traders half a century ago have left Great Britain hearing all the burdens and enjoying only half the advantages which should attach to the advantage. He devotes considerable space to the effect of protection upon combinations in countries in which protection exists. "The real free trader points out, is that the advantage of the manufacturer, who is unable to compete with the manufacturer who is able to sell abroad at a lower price than he charges for the same article at home. He gives an instance of German steel in this particular, saying that it is being cheaper in England than the English manufacturer can possibly produce it. Mr. Balfour declares that the optimistic free trader advocates a continuance of the free trade policy, which is the policy of the British Empire, and that it is through negotiation which, he says, can only appeal to self-interest, in foreign protection, to self-interest, coupled with sentiment."

BOARD OF TRADE FIGURES.

London, Sept. 16.—On the heels of Premier Balfour's academic exposition of his personal views of the fiscal question, contained in the pamphlet on "Insular Free Trade," advance sheets of which were issued last night, came the long promised and much-demanded Government statistics dealing with that subject. They were issued this morning by the Board of Trade, in the shape of a blue book of nearly 500 pages of bewildering tables of figures, showing the various aspects of British and foreign trade and the industrial conditions. No deductions are drawn, though the publication is furnished with interesting notes upon what are regarded as points of fact. The references to foreign trade were chiefly confined to France, Germany and the United States.

Murder and Suicide.

Noblesville, Ind., Sept. 16.—William Howe shot and killed his daughter-in-law shortly after midnight. He then refilled the rifle with which he committed the murder and killed himself. The victim had been divorced from Howe's son.
