A COUPLE REUNITED AFTER TWENTY YEARS

Hoboken Captain Comes Back to Find His Wife Wedded to Another.

New York, June 12.—After a separation of nearly twenty years Abraham Halsey, a Hoboken barge captain, is to join his wife again, though she has wedded another man, believing him to be dead. The husband held a conference, and the second, Charles Rich, has started for his former home in Kentucky.

Capt. Halsey left his wife at Pittsburgh in 1883 and went to California. All trace of him was lost; his wife left her Pittsburgh home and, on the publication of his reported death, Mrs. Halsey married again. The captain recently returned to this city and met his wife on the street. Both are over 60 years old.

STEAMER ASHORE IN ST. LAWRENCE.

Bic. Que., June 12. The steamer Sahara, bound for Montreal, and loaded with rice, went ashore on the west reef of Biquette Island last night.

Captain Cave arrived in Bic this morning, and has asked assistance. The steamer is in a very bad position, making water, and unless assistance is sent immediately she will be ruined with her cargo.

EXPOSITIONS THAT FAILED.

Washington, June 12.—Several creditors of the Buffalo Pan-American Exposition Company, including the Loud Lumber Company, Osceola, have joined issues to get a bill through congress appropriating sufficient money to meet the liabilities existing by reason of financial failure of the exposition. The Charleston Exposition has closed with a deficiency of \$100,000 and congress is asked to make that good also.

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FIERY TIME IN PAWTUCKET

The Street Cars Pelted and Held Up by a Mob.

Deputy Sheriff Fire on the Crowd—Boy Seriously Wounded.

Pawtucket, R. I., June 12.—The city officials having declined to increase the police force to meet the unusual conditions resulting from the strike of the Union Traction Company's men here and in Providence, eight companies of infantry and two troops of cavalry are patrolling the streets today by order of Gov. Kimball.

Last evening a detachment of sixteen special deputy sheriffs was attacked by a crowd which had held up and demolished a street car. The officers were stoned and a number of persons were injured, but none fatally. There was no trouble this forenoon. Cars were run, guarded by deputy sheriffs, with some regularity, but few passengers.

Since the strike began on June 2, crowds have opposed the running of cars, and the guards of deputies on each car have encountered growing hostility. Mayor Fitzgerald was appealed to to increase the number of police, but he declined, on the ground that the city's financial condition would not permit it. The national guardsmen ordered out were supplied at Providence with shotted ammunition.

About noon four cars became stalled in a crowd on Pawtucket avenue. They were each guarded by deputy sheriffs and special officers. Troop K of the cavalry and Company A were hurried over. Part formed ahead of the car and part behind. A bombardment of stones began, and several officers and men were struck and slightly injured. A volley of shots was fired by the deputies. The crowd fell back and the car proceeded. Chief of Police Rice advised the people to quit the streets, but the crowds were disposed to be insolent. Soon after, a car escorted by cavalry and filled with deputy sheriffs, was stalled in Main street by a mob. Stones crashed through the windows, and a volley was fired by the deputies. Tanner Fitzgerald, 12 years of age, who was in the crowd, fell shot. This staggered the crowd, and the car passed on, badly battered. A doctor said that the boy was critically injured.

While the militia is policing the city, Pawtucket is not under martial law. Tonight Mayor Fitzgerald, who has been away on his wedding trip, returned, and is using his influence with the populace to maintain order. In the presence of about 1,000 persons and the militia, this evening, Adjutant General Sackett read the riot act.

HEARTLESS MASSACRE BY MEXICAN TROOPS

Over a Hundred Women and Children Shot Down Like Dogs.

Tucson, Arizona, June 13.—A prominent Arizona banker, just arrived from Prietas, Sonora, gives details of a massacre of Yaqui Indians, men, women, and children, Tuesday, in Santa Rosa Canyon, 35 miles from the Monas Prietas mines, by a detachment of Gen. Torres' troops.

It appears that the Yaqui forces that were operating in that section had moved further into the mountains, leaving their women and children in Santa Rosa Canyon under a guard of 80 men. The Mexican troops came upon this camp, and without warning opened a terrible fire, sparing neither women nor children. After the first volley the troops charged down upon the panic-stricken victims and massacred all within their reach.

Of the guard of 80 Yaquis, not a single one survived, and more than 100 women and children fell victims to the bullets and bayonets.

The bodies of the dead were left in the canyon, and the remaining women and children were driven to Monas Prietas by the soldiers, and from that point will be taken to Hermosillo.

"KID" TRAIN-WRECKERS ARRESTED.

Toronto, June 13.—The youngest would-be train-wreckers ever arrested in Ontario slept Wednesday night at the Children's Shelter. Their names are Wm. and James Reid, Streetville, aged 8 and 9 years respectively. They are charged with trying to wreck a C. P. R. passenger train near Streetsville, on Tuesday evening, at a point near Streetsville where there is an embankment, a rail was found across the track. Fortunately the train was stopped in time to avert an accident.

A watch was set, and Wednesday night the little chaps were discovered putting a stone across one of the rails. When arrested and questioned, they said that a man named "Bill," whose name or place of residence they did not know, had given them a quarter to put the train off, and had helped them to put the rail across the track the night before. They explained in the most innocent way that they wanted to see what the train would look like off the rails. The police are looking for "Bill."

BRITISH COLUMBIA KICK
