

**LION AND BEAR TO WIPE OUT FRICTION
AND MAKE EUROPE ONE HAPPY FAMILY****British and Russian Governments Believed to be Arranging Agreement to Insure
Prolonged Peace in Central Asia.**

London, Oct. 6.—Following closely upon the publication of the text of the Anglo-Japanese treaty has come considerable talk of the possibility of an understanding between Great Britain and Russia. All the newspapers are devoting columns to the discussion of the question, pointing out that if Russia is sincere in her expressions of a desire for peace in Central Asia there is no reason why the two ancient enemies should not come to an agreement that will not only assure peace, but clear away the suspicions leading to friction which have existed for years.

Negotiations Started.

That negotiations with this object in view are pending seems possible, though definite official confirmation is lacking. Color is lent to the rumors that have been floating about by the recent frequent visits paid to the foreign office by the Russian ambassador

since his return from his holidays a fortnight ago, and the fact that the foreign Secretary Lansdowne who returned from his vacation to publish the text of the Anglo-Japanese treaty, has not resumed it. Count Benckendorff, the Russian ambassador, had a long interview with Lord Lansdowne at the foreign office yesterday, and the latter left London immediately afterwards for Balmoral, Scotland, where Premier Balfour is present as minister in attendance to King Edward. Of course the visits of the Russian ambassador to the foreign office may have been connected with Emperor Nicholas' invitation to Great Britain to participate in the second peace conference at The Hague, but Great Britain has already answered his majesty's preliminary invitation.

Time is Opportune.

It is thought here that the present is an opportune moment for reaching a better understanding between the

two countries, both the British and Russian papers having strongly advocated it for the past week.

Britain's Objects Peaceful.

The position of the British Government was clearly stated in a speech delivered by Gerald Balfour, president of the local government board, yesterday, in which he said: "Great Britain has no intention of making aggressive movements in Central Asia. Our object is defense and not defiance, and if the Russian Government desires to come to an understanding with us with reference to our respective interests in that part of the world, it will not find the British Government backward in readiness to consider any proposal which it might desire to put forward. The newspaper discussion has reached a much wider range and includes suggestions for agreements, which, if carried out and lived up to would make Europe a family in which there would be no differences."

**HAUCH'S DEATH
WAS ACCIDENTAL****Hammer, His Friend, Admits
Firing Fatal Shot During
the Charivari.**

Cassell, Oct. 5.—Simon Hammer, a young man of this place, before the coroner's jury on the Hauch inquest here tonight, admitted having fired the shot that killed John S. Hauch during a charivari of a newly-wed East Zorra couple. Hammer broke down as he told of the tragic occurrence.

After hearing the evidence, the jury retired, and a few minutes before 9 o'clock returned with the following verdict:

"We, the jury, unanimously agree that John S. Hauch met his death by a bullet from a revolver accidentally discharged by Simon Hammer, at 10 p.m. on the 16th of September, at East Zorra, on the evening of the 16th of September."

EX-LONDONER DROWNED**Body of Ing Hang, Chinaman, Found
in Toronto Bay.**

Toronto, Oct. 5.—The body of Ing Hang, aged 37, was found floating in the bay tonight.

Hang came here from London, Ont., a week ago, and had been employed in the Chinese restaurant at 1225 Queen street from where he disappeared last Friday.

There are no marks of foul play on the body.

The Suez Open Again.

Suez, Egypt, Oct. 5.—Traffic on the canal is being resumed. Fifty steamers, which arrived here from the dynamite-laden steamer Chatham, entered the canal today. There are 90 vessels at Port Said awaiting passage.

Death of Mrs. Penfield.

New York, Oct. 6.—Mrs. Catherine Albert Penfield, wife of Frederick Courtland Penfield, a former American consular agent, and consul-general to Egypt, died on Wednesday of heart disease at a hotel here. She was 60 years old. Mrs. Penfield was at one time the center of an international dispute. Before she married Mr. Penfield in London, she was the widow of Col. Edward McDermid, who inherited from him an interest in the Delagoa Bay Railroad. She inherited from him the claim for \$1,500,000 in the claims against Portugal on account of the seizure of the line in 1888. In prosecuting her claim she appealed to Secretary Blaine, and under pressure, Portugal allowed the matter to be arbitrated. She finally received \$600,000.

**LONDON BOX CO.
BUYS NEW SITE****Will Erect New Factory in the
Spring—G. T. R. Takes
Old Property.**

Mr. F. G. Rumball, the principal shareholder in the London Box Company, stated today that the site of the factory on the north side of Bathurst street, east of Wellington street, had been sold to the Grand Trunk. This gives the railway possession of all the land in the block named, which will next year be converted into an immense yard, together with the land on the north side of Bathurst street, from Richmond street east to Adelaide street.

Mr. Rumball was asked if the London Box Company intended to build another factory on the site of the old Bathurst street works which were destroyed by fire in August, and he replied that such was the intention. The company had purchased the McCord-Bathurst property on the south side of Bathurst street, adjoining the London Machine Tool Company's works, and on this a new box factory will be erected in the spring. It was hardly possible that work would be commenced this fall. The box company has also made an arrangement with the Dymott-Baker Company for the use of a portion of the Tool Company's factory until their new factory is built. There was a possibility of the box company locating east of the box factory, and south of the G. T. R. where Mr. Rumball has other factories, but the Bathurst street site was considered more suitable for the purposes of the

**PACIFIC LINER
HARD ON ROCKS****S. S. St. Paul a Total Wreck
Off Californian Coast—All
on Board Escape.**

Eureka, Cal., Oct. 6.—Fast upon the rocks a mile and a half south of Point Gorda, the San Francisco and Portland Company's steamer St. Paul, Captain Randall, lies a total wreck. Its 32 passengers and crew of 65 men are safe. Some are on board the steamer Pomona, en route to San Francisco, but the greater number are in Eureka, having been taken off by the tug Ranger, of Eureka, and the steamer Vanguard.

The St. Paul was on its usual course and the weather was clear until Point Gorda was approached. When the steamer ran into the fog Third Officer Holmes was on the bridge. The first warning he had of danger was the roar of the surf. He immediately changed the ship's course, but it was too late. Considering the circumstances, there was unusual good order preserved among all on board. Captain Randall said there was no panic or unnecessary confusion.

A RUSSIAN CATASTROPHE**Building Collapses in St. Petersburg
and Barles Workmen.**

St. Petersburg, Oct. 6.—A five-story building in course of construction here collapsed today, and a hundred workmen were buried in the ruins.

Up to the time this dispatch was filed only seven of the men had been extricated. They were seriously injured.

JAPS CLING TO POSITIONS**Trouble in Arranging for an Armistice
in Northern Korea.**

Seoul, Korea, Oct. 6.—A Japanese staff officer today said that after three meetings the terms of an armistice in Northern Korea are still unarranged, although no further fighting has occurred. The Russian insist that the Japanese give up their present positions, but the latter refuse to create a neutral zone by evacuating the places they occupied after hard fighting.

**WEREN'T HEELED
TO MEET HEALER****Cripples "Go Broke" To See
Sharman, Then Ask City to
Send Them Home.**

The presence of Sharman the self-styled "healer," in the city has brought to the city during the past few days persons from all parts of the country, who are anxious to be relieved of their ills. In the number have been several cripples—cripples who have been compelled to use crutches for years. They went to Sharman, and were not healed. At least, that is what two of them said when they called at the office of Inspector McCallum. They did not go to Mr. McCallum expressly to tell him that they would have to continue to carry their crutches. They went to whisper in his ear that they were "broke," financially, and that they were eager to get home.

It seems that the applicants came to the city with very little money, and that after they visited the "healer" they had less. Not having enough to purchase a return ticket to their homes, they were compelled to seek the aid of the city.

CAVE-IN KILLS FOURTEEN**Gang of Hungarian Laborers Perish
in Eastern State Pit.**

Troy, N. Y., Oct. 6.—Sixteen men were buried this morning in a cave-in of the Vermont State Company's quarry, which is situated about two and a half miles from Granville, N. Y. Just over the Vermont State Line, David Gaddalade, and Warren Queen, the foreman of the quarry, were killed. The latter is expected to die. The fourteen dead include J. B. Williams, the president of the company, and Hungarian laborers. Four bodies had been removed by 11 o'clock. The residents of Granville and the neighboring country are helping in the work of rescue.

COAL RIGHT UP TO WEIGHT**Dealers' Scales Working O. K., So
Don't Be Suspicious.**

Inspector McCallum did not have any very pressing business to transact at the city hall for a short time this morning, and he took a stroll, partly for the purpose of getting some fresh October air, and partly to satisfy himself that the coal dealers of the city were giving the people full weight.

**LAKE ERIE POACHERS
BETWEEN TWO FIRES**

Detroit, Mich., Oct. 6.—The United States revenue cutter Morrill left Detroit last night, having on board Collector of Customs Leach, of Cleveland, who will take a hand in the work of putting a stop to depredations of American fishing tugs in Canadian waters. The Morrill will cruise Lake Erie for several days, going as far east as Dunkirk. Collector Leach has a license to investigate the cargo of any fishing boat he comes upon, and any fishermen found guilty of violating the customs law by failure to enter his catch in Canadian waters will be arrested, his cargo and vessel seized, and proceedings against the institution of the collector.

This puts the poachers between two fires, both Governments being arrayed against them. The poachers claim that the turn of affairs will largely put a stop to the wholesale taking of fish in Canadian waters by American fishermen.

IRISH M. P. GOES TO JAIL**Prefers It to Furnishing \$1,000
Surety for Good Behavior.**

Dublin, Oct. 5.—John O'Donnell, Nationalist member for South Mayo, was ordered by the high court today to find \$1,000 surety for his good behavior or go to jail for three months. Mr. O'Donnell elected to go to jail. The action arose from a recent inflammatory speech delivered by Mr. O'Donnell which was followed by an excited tenor, and a collision between the two parties. The crown prosecutor urged that such speeches lead to disorder and crime, and this view was upheld by the court.

LECTURED THE SLUGGERS**Ottawa Footballers Before Magistrate
Because of Roughness.**

Ottawa, Oct. 6.—Hal Walters and Tom Boucher, of the St. Patrick's Ottawa football team, appeared in the police court this morning charged with assault, which arose out of the match of last Saturday played here against the Montreal Police Magistrate O'Keefe. The players were lectured against rough playing, and ended by letting them go on condition that they would preserve and purify the game, and he hoped it would have a good effect.

**REPUBLICAN ROW
OVER RECIPROCITY****State Convention Debating
Tariff Against Canada.****REVISIONISTS AND ANTIS CLASH****Reciprocity Delegates Want Plank
Removing Duty on Hides, Iron Ore,
Lumber and Pulpwood.**

Boston, Oct. 6.—A factional contest upon the question of tariff revision, especially with reference to reciprocity with Canada, which involved the nomination of a candidate for lieutenant-governor, and the presence of five aspirants for the nomination of attorney-general, gave unusual interest to the Republican state convention in Tremont Temple here today.

Although the committee spent yesterday evening in hearing the arguments of the reciprocity supporters, and late last night had reached a decision to introduce a compromise plank in the convention platform, early today it seemed likely that a collision between the advocates of reciprocity and those who opposed tariff changes on the floor of the convention, could not be prevented, because of the demand of the revisionists for more specific utterances than the committee was willing to make.

The reciprocity delegates declare they will insist on a plank demanding the removal of the duty on hides, iron ore, lumber and wood pulp. The resolutions committee is not willing to go beyond a statement favoring a revision and readjustment of the tariff, and the enactment of a tariff provisions which will secure the treatment accorded to the most favored nations in all foreign markets. The high protection wing regarded this as a substantial concession to the reciprocity element and are enthusiastic in declaring that if further concessions were demanded in the convention they will oppose revision of any kind.

Lieutenant-Governor Curtis Gould, Jun., was the only candidate for governor, and he will probably be nominated by acclamation. For lieutenant-governor the candidates were Eben S. Briggs, of Hopkedge, representing the most rigid protection element; Mr. Hall and Col. A. H. Goetting, of Springfield, the moderate element, and the early indications were that the question of a nominee would not be decided until after several ballots. There are four candidates.

**London Has 43,100 Souls;
Fourth Ward the Leader****City's Population Shows an Increase of 1,400 During
the Past Year—Each Ward Gives an Increase.**

A statement prepared by Assessment Commissioner Grant shows that the population of London has increased 1,402 during the past year.

London can now boast of over 43,100 souls, whereas last year it could not claim 42,000.

To the fourth ward belongs the credit of having the largest population, and to the same ward also goes the credit of having the greatest increase in the year.

The third ward comes second both in the matter of population and increase,

with the first ward a close second—in the matter of population.

The second ward is the cellar champion in point of population, being nearly 2,000 behind the first ward.
