wished to call at his home for a parcel
and that they would proceed south-
ward. Upon arriving at Smart's
Hotel at Odell, in Westminster Town-
ship, Smart invited Martyn in and the

The first thing Martyn
knew, Sheehy had his pocketbook be-
hind the bar. When asked for it,

the court to commit a defendant," said
Prosecuting Attorney McKillop.

Squire Gerrill thought that the evi-

for trial. Mr. McKillop had no objec-
tion to granting bail, which was fixed
at \$1,400 each.

TORONTO DIVINE ON CITIZENSHIP

**Rev. Dr. Crumphy Speaks at
Dundas Street Church on
League Anniversary.**

The duties of citizenship were clearly
laid down by Rev. Dr. Crumphy,
of Toronto, in the Dundas Street Meth-
odist church last evening, on the oc-
casion of the Epworth League anniver-
sary. In a masterly address, founded
on Paul's message to the Philippians
when the apostle commissioned them
to behave as citizens worthy of the
Gospel of Christ, Dr. Crumphy spoke
of the duties devolving upon citizens of
today.

One idea of citizenship was that each
one should mind his own business. This
was impossible, said Dr. Crumphy, for
people's businesses were also affected
or were an effect. There must be an
esprit de corps. Paul's message said
that the people should strive together
as athletes on behalf of the Gospel.
The expression, "as athletes," was a
particularly happy one. Nowhere could
the discipline be obtained that is dis-
ciple from a first-class athletic game,
such as football, where two antago-
nists come together for a few moments
in strenuous resistance, often to the
discomfort of one or both of the par-
ties, but immediately arise without
further thought of each other to pay
their attention to the main object—the
ball. Christian citizens in their work
should never lose sight of the objects
aimed at to engage in personal or par-
ty strife. A real moment would be so
thoroughly sought after.

"Be something yourselves and you'll
always produce results proportionate
to your being," said Dr. Crumphy. Such
action might not, perhaps, produce a
numerical revival, but a wider circle
would be affected, and such influence
would be of infinite value to Christian
