SUNDAY WAS BUSY
DAY FOR FIREMEN

Brigade Responded to Three Alarms—Damage Was Slight in All Cases.

The firemen had a busy day yesterday responding to no less than three alarms.

The first was turned in at 3:30 a.m. from Richmond and Dundas streets, smoke being seen issuing from Dr. Santo's office. The noise of the firemen and the clanging of bells awoke the occupants of the buildings, and they came rushing out in all sorts of apparel. No. 3 company responded, and the fire was put out with no more loss than a destroyed awning. The blaze was undoubtedly started by a cigar or match being thrown out of one of the upper windows.

"PEOPLE'S FORUM"
DISCUSS EDUCATION

It Was Stated That the Children of the Workers Are Debarred From All That Is Good.

The first meeting of the People's Forum was held yesterday evening in St. George's Hall, Richmond street. The subject, "The Needs of the Children of London," was opened by Mr. Appleton, and resulted in an interesting discussion. It seemed to take the minds of those who followed the lead was to the effect that as every child of the laborer, the artisan and the public, obtains his opportunity through the manipulation of political machinery, it therefore follows that the people can only defend themselves by political education, organization and the business use of the ballot.

In Mr. Sargent's idea the chief need was for some rearrangement or modification of the educational system so as to open the higher parts of it to the children of all the people. The argument of those who championed this idea was that the economic condition of the hand-workers practically debarred their children from the use of any part of the system, but the public schools, in which only the merest rudiments were taught.

The speaker also it was pointed out that the remodeling of the civil service examinations places the service on a basis that excludes all but the children of the middle and upper classes, as an applicant for a position for bookkeeper must now pass an examination in Latin and zoology, with other "ologies."

Next Sunday evening the subject, "How Shall We Care for the Unemployed?" will be discussed. Mr. Hill will introduce the subject, outlining a plan by which the city can keep the out-of-works employed without being an expense to the city.

New York, June 21.—A cable dispatch to the Sun from London says: Welshmen are bitter against the suffragettes for disturbing Premier Asquith's speech at the Eisteddfod. At a suffragette meeting in a Welsh town they retaliated by interrupting the women speakers with shouting and cheering for Mr. Asquith and Mr. Lloyd-George. Mrs. Cobden-Saunders, when she attempted to speak, encountered a perfect tornado of jeers, hoots and cries of "Why did you destroy our Eisteddfod?"

A motion favoring votes for women received only a dozen supporters, while young Welshmen from surrounding districts sang national air during the whole meeting.
