

GREAT W. O. B. A. TOURNEY CLOSES ARMITAGE, OF PARIS, WINNING

Copped Tecumseh Trophy
From W. R. Vining and
His Great Rink.

NIGHTINGALE WON
McNEE TROPHY

Beating Out Skip Fred Allen
in the Finals—Presentation
to Popular Secretary.

The great Western Ontario Bowling
Association tournament is finished for
the year, with the exception of a few
games in the second match of the
Scotch doubles, which will be rolled off
today or next week.

The winners of the association trophy
is Skip J. S. Armitage, of Paris,
with Skip W. R. Vining, runner-up.
The consolation finals went to Skip
George Nightingale, who defeated Skip
Fred N. Allen's good bowlers in the
finals. Jimmy Tyler and Fred Bell
won the primary match of the Scotch
doubles, from Charlie Farquharson
and R. K. Miller, the Stratford pair.

A Delightful Tourney.
The bowlers all left last evening for
their homes, a tired but well-pleased
lot of men. The tourney was ex-
tremely pleasant and altogether de-
lightful.

The finals of the association series
were played yesterday afternoon and
won by Skip J. S. Armitage, Barney
Vining, the London skip, whose rink
has been one of the real sensations of
the tourney, did not show the form of
previous games, and were outbowed.
The game was a good one and was
followed by quite a gallery, who ap-
plauded the clever plays of both
quartettes. Paris got a lead of six in
the tenth end, and from that time on
had the best of the play. Frank Smoke,
third on Armitage's rink, bowled most
effectively all through the game.

London Gets McNeen Cup.
The finals in the consolation lay be-
tween Skip Fred Allen and Skip Dick
Thomson in the semi-finals of the con-
solation, Thomson put Allen out of the
trophy, but Allen put him out of the
consolation.

The prizes were presented by Hon.
A. G. MacKay, president of the W. O.
B. A., to Skip Abbott and his rink,
Skip John Lochead and his four, Skip
J. S. Armitage and his Parisians, and
to Barney Vining and his youngsters.
The president spoke of the enjoyable
time visitors always had at the tour-
ney at London.

The President Speaks.
"The hospitality of your people is
unbounded, and I know of no
place where it is such a pleas-
ure to visit," he said. "Everybody
seems to conspire with me to make
it as pleasant as possible."
"This tourney has been most suc-
cessful, the largest ever held on the
continent of America. It is simply
wonderful."

He presented the prizes to the win-
ners with a few words of graceful
compliment. The successful bowlers
made short speeches in reply.
The most popular presentation came
when Hon. Mr. MacKay called for Sec-
retary James D. Tyler, and on behalf
of the association, presented him with
a purse of gold as a gift from the as-
sociation.

Presentation to Secretary.
"The gold in this purse does not glit-
ter brighter than the good qualities of
the honorary secretary of the W. O. B.
A.," declared Mr. MacKay in handing
over the money.

Jimmy made a brief reply, in which
he thanked the president for his kind
words, and expressed the hope that he
would be able to serve them for years
to come.

Jack Bowden and his partner got
fourth money in the Scotch doubles. "I
just hung around as long as I could
and as a result I will take home a little
prize, just to show them I was here,"
he explained.

P. M. Love continued his fine bow-
ling right up to the last, and estab-
lished a reputation for being one of
the best trundlers in the game.

Skip Willson Wins.
Skip J. S. Willson, of Toronto, and
Skip Hughes, of Stratford, played off
a special game to decide who should
have fourth place in the Consolation
series, and the Toronto man won quite
handily.

It was fitting that the rink, formerly
skipped by Jack McNeen, should win
the trophy presented by him for the

Got Away After Scoring Twice—
Walter Cox Heavily Fined.

Detroit, July 31.—It was after 5
o'clock before Hamburg Belle was
brought out for her trial against
her record. She was accompanied
by a number of drivers, and Ben-
yon, after scoring twice, Andrews
nodded for the word, and she was
sent away trotting a two-minute
clip. The quarter was reached in 33 1/2
seconds, and then Andrews took her
back a half mile, where she found it
1:01 1/2. The three-quarters was reached
in 1:31 3/4, making the third quarter
in 30 1/2 seconds. Through the home-
stretch Andrews her up, and with
the runner thundering alongside
she flashed under the wire in 2:02 3/4.
Time which has only been beaten by
four under the conditions. Lea Dil-
lon trotted in 2:01 and Major Delmar
in 2:02 and Crescens in 2:02 1/4 at Col-
umbus several years ago. On behalf
of the Detroit Driving Club, Presiding
Judge Newton presented Andrews
with a beautiful silver loving cup as
a reward for her wonderful perfor-
mance of the bay mare.

Cox had been fined \$200 for not trying
for the first heat of the 2 1/2 race with
