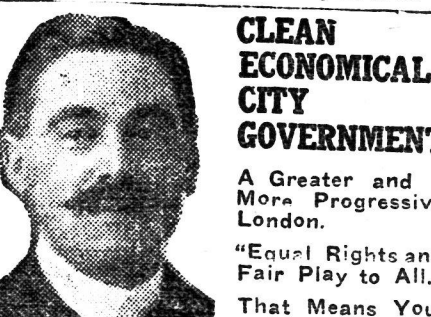

BRAKEMAN W. PRENTISS ALMOST ASPHYXIATED

He Awoke in Nick of Time—
Physician Attended Him and
Pulled Him Through.

Walter Prentiss, of Niagara Falls, a
brakeman on the Grand Trunk, had a
close call from being asphyxiated yester-
day, when, after coming in from his
run, he went to his room in a local
hotel, and left open the door of a stove
in the room and went to sleep.

It seems that Prentiss had just put
fresh coal in the stove, and being very
tired, went right off to sleep. He
awakened some time after, and was
very sick, but managed to summon as-
sistance.

Dr. H. A. Kingsmill was called and
had Prentiss removed at once to Vic-
toria Hospital. He was very sick for
some time, but had recovered suffi-
ciently last night to go to his home at
the Falls.

JACK FROST RULES IN SUNNY SOUTH

Southern States Experience the
Lowest Temperature of
its History.

Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 31.—A cold wave
prevailed over the entire South yester-
day, not even the orange belt of
Southern Florida being exempt from
the freezing temperature. The mercury
ranged from 2 degrees above zero at
Asheville, N.C., to 32 degrees at El
Paso, Texas, with 28 at Tampa. A
few Texas points and the extreme
southern portion of the Florida penin-
sula alone escaped the cold.

This, according to the local weather
bureau, was the coldest day of the
coldest December the South has ever
experienced.

At 8 o'clock yesterday morning the
thermometer registered ten degrees
above in Atlanta, and for twenty days
past freezing weather has been ex-
perienced here. There has been much
suffering among the poor, especially
the negroes.

At Birmingham, Ala., where the
minimum was twelve degrees above
zero, two negroes were frozen to death,
and near Decatur, with the thermom-
eter around five above zero, a family
of six rescued yesterday were more
dead than alive, with one of the chil-
dren expected to die.

For the first time since 1886, there
was ice in the Chattahoochee River at
Atlanta. Similar conditions prevailed
in the rivers of Tennessee, North
Carolina and the western part of North
Carolina.

While it is believed that no serious
damage has been done the Florida
orange crop, Fernandina reports that
oranges were frozen in that section.
Cotton planters of the southwestern
section hail with delight the severe
cold, believing that millions of the
boll weevil have been destroyed.

WOULD CLOSE BARS ON CHRISTMAS DAY

An Attempt Will Be Made to
Amend the Liquor
License Act.

Toronto, Dec. 30.—At the coming
session of the Legislature which will
be called to meet in the last week of
January an amendment to the liquor
license act is to be made whereby the
sale of intoxicating liquors is to be
prohibited on Christmas Day. Temper-
ance people desire that the restriction
should be made to apply to Good Fri-
day and Thanksgiving Day as well as
Christmas. It is not likely that the
Government will go this far, but con-
siderable measures to Christmas
Day. Police records here for three
years show 155 drunks for three
Christmas days and five for three New
Year's days, when hotels are closed on
account of municipal elections.

Toronto, Dec. 31.—The Ontario Gov-
ernment is now offering Government
stock for sale in any multiple of fifty
dollars at two per cent per annum.
The principal will be paid on the first
of June, 1910, and the interest is paid
by check half-yearly on the first of
June and December.

This is a "trustee and executor in-
vestment" and can be transferred in
the same manner as stocks. This stock
is free from all provincial taxation,
including succession duty.

ONTARIO GOVERNMENT STOCK FOR SALE

Any Multiple of Fifty Dollars
Can Be Had at 2 Per Cent
Per Annum.

Toronto, Dec. 31.—It is expected that
Hon. G. P. Graham will make during
January the annual statement to Par-
liament respecting the Intercolonial
Railway, and unusual interest attaches
to it inasmuch as this is the first year
of management by commission. It was
stated that the commission expected
to make an even break at least of this year's
revenue and expenditure, and it is be-
lieved that this will be the result even

DENTAL TEACHERS ELECT

Pedagogics Select Dr. Bryant, of In-
dianapolis, for President.

Toronto, Dec. 31.—The seventeenth
annual meeting of the Institute of
Dental Pedagogics was concluded yester-
day. The principal business was the
election of officers. The vote was
taken quickly, and in every case but
one the election was unanimous. In
J. Q. Bryant, of Indianapolis, last
year's vice-president, was promoted
to the office of president. Dr. D. M.
Gallie, of Chicago, is vice-president.
Dr. P. W. Gethro, of Chicago, was not
in as secretary-treasurer, and Dr. B.
E. Fischer, of St. Louis, was appointed
to the executive board, in the place
left vacant by Dr. Gallie. This last was
the only office contested.

THE JUVENILE ACT FOR THIS PROVINCE

Moral Reformers Will Ask the Legisla-
ture to Adopt It.

Toronto, Dec. 31.—Moral reformers
have decided to make application to
the Ontario Legislature at the coming
session for an act bringing into force
the Juvenile Delinquents' Act of the
Dominion of Canada.

Under this act children under the
age of 21 are placed in an institution
of detention, different altogether from
the jails and the prisons, where they
are saved from contact with the hard-
ened criminals and old offenders.

The indeterminate sentence and the
extension of the provisions of the juve-
nile act in first offenders and by kindly
and sympathetic treatment reform
and young those who seemed des-
tined for lives of crime.

TO CENTRALIZE OFFICE

The Ontario Government Closes Its
Agency at Liverpool.

Toronto, Dec. 31.—The Provincial
Government has decided to close the
branch offices of the Ontario coloniza-
tion department at Liverpool. Under
cabinet instructions the offices will
cease operations tonight.

The decision to close the office at
Liverpool is incidental to the plans of
the government for the general ex-
pansion and development of the cen-
tral offices on the Strand, London. A
general rearrangement along lines of
careful expansion is, it is understood,
under consideration by the Govern-
ment, and an official announcement of
early next week.

OPPOSE INCREASE IN OCEAN RATES

Toronto, Dec. 31.—The board of trade
at a special meeting of the council
passed a resolution that an urgent ap-
peal be made to all Canadian ship-
ping companies to resist any proposed
increase in ocean rates from Britain
and other European countries to Can-
ada on the ground that any such in-
crease must tend to divert to the
factories of the United States trade
which the preference was designed to
encourage with Britain. Copies of
the resolution will be sent to the
Prime Minister, one to the Minister of
Trade and Commerce and the Minis-
ter of Marine.

GUERIN FOR MAYOR

Citizens' Association of Montreal
Issue Reform Slate.

Montreal, Dec. 31.—The Citizens
Association, which is fighting for
civic reform, announced the following
slate for mayor and board of control:
Mayor—Dr. J. J. Guerin.
Board of Control—Dr. E. P. Lachapelle, president of the provincial board
of health; Mr. P. E. Warkentin, June
president and managing director of
the Dominion Coal Company; Louis
N. Dupuis, retired merchant, and Jos.
Aime, a carpenter and prominent
labor man.

A strong campaign will be engineer-
ed by the Citizens' Association for
these candidates, while the contests
for the reduced seats on the council
will be left to local influence.

WILL GO TO ST. THOMAS

Rev. G. F. Salton Accepts Invitation
to First Methodist Church, St.
Thomas.

Stratford, Dec. 31.—Rev. G. F. Sal-
ton, Ph. B. pastor of the Central
Methodist Church, has accepted an in-
vitation to become pastor of the First
Methodist Church, St. Thomas, at the
close of his present term on Jan. 1,
1911, subject to the usual conditions.
Mr. Salton went from Stratford to
the church in St. Thomas in 1896, af-
ter his last pastorate in the Central, so
that the people know him not only by
reputation, but from actual experience
as a pastor. He has had two or three
other invitations, but after deliberation
he has now decided as stated.

REV. DR. CURRIE DEAD

Was Lecturer on Hebrew in the Pine
Hill College.

Halifax, Dec. 31.—The death occurred
here yesterday of Rev. Dr. John Cur-
rie, professor of Hebrew in the Pine
Hill College, a Presbyterian theological
institution. He was in his 81st year.
The deceased was born in Tasmania,
Glenorchy, N. S., and was educated in
Scotland. He spent some years in
the active ministry in Nova Scotia be-
fore being appointed to the chair of
Hebrew and Exegesis at Pine Hill. He
was recognized as an able Hebrew
scholar. Dr. Currie leaves eight chil-
dren.

DENY MERGER STORY

Manager of Westinghouse Says They
Are Not in It.

Hamilton, Ont., Dec. 31.—Mr. Paul
J. Meyer, manager of the Canadian
Westinghouse company, today gave
an unqualified denial to the story that
his company, the Allis-Chalmers Com-
pany, of Montreal, and the Canadian
General Electric Company are about
to amalgamate.

**A SMALLPOX CASE
ALLOWED TO ESCAPE**
Said to Have Had Suspicious Sym-
ptoms While at Large.

Windsor, Dec. 31.—Dr. Bell, provin-
cial health inspector, is investigating a
case of smallpox in an isolation
hospital at St. Thomas.

The man was in Windsor two weeks
and a physician reported to Dr. Alex-
ander, the local health officer, that
the man had had suspicious symptoms. Dr.
Alexander went to the hotel at once,
but the man had left and no trace of
him could be found.

Dr. Bell is inclined to blame the
Windsor physicians, who discovered
Johnson's case, for allowing him to
escape their observation, and travel
about from city to city.

He also proposes to have the law
amended which gives physicians 2
hours in which to report contagious
disease cases.

WEIGHING OF COAL

Ottawa, Dec. 30.—In amendment
to a former order regarding the
weighing of coal at frontier points in
Ontario, the railway commission has
issued a new order whereby the coal
must be weighed by automatic scales
at the points where it is imported.

In this way coal dealers will be re-
lieved of the prevailing and much
complained trouble of accepting
shippers' weights.
