Toronto, Dec. 31.—The board of trade at a special meeting of the counci passed a resolution that an urgent appeal be made to all Canadian shipping companies to resist any proposed increase in ocean rates from Britain and other European countries to Canada on the ground that any such increase must tend to divert to the factories of the United States trade which the preference was designed to encourage with Britain. Copies of the resolution will be sent to the Prime Minister, one to the Minister of Trade and Commerce and the Minister of Marine.
