There were 107 teachers employed, firsts, 98 seconds, 3 thirds and 1 emporary: 20 male teachers and 87 female teachers.

The number enrolled was 4.010: 767 in the primary class, 621 in the first class, 701 in the second class, 805 in the third class, 952 in the fourth class and 161 beyond the fourth class. Inspector Pleased.

The inspector speaks very highly o the classification of the pupils. This he attributes largely to the rigid system of promotions in vogue in the inspectorate

The latter part of the report consists of short paragraphs in which reference is made to the school visits. school gardens, new school houses, the work done in the Melbourne Continuation School, Teachers' Institutes, etc. The report as a whole contains a large amount of information, shows great care in its preparation, and we may add that it shows that the schools in West Middlesex are in a prosper-

Woman Jumped From the Cleveland in Indian Ocean-Rescued in Vain.


