Hot Springs, Ark., Aug. 11 .- "There are more than ten thousand police officers in New York City, and nine thousand of them would not hesitate to put me out of the way if they had half a chance," declared Sam Scheppe, arrested in this city late yesterday afternoon as the go-between in the New York police graft scandal, and who is alleged to have paid the murderers of the gambler Rosenthal their fee for committing the murder.

"I do not want to go back with those Burns detectives nor with Whitman's representatives. I will give you \$500, Captain Howell, if you will take me back right away, and not say anything to them as to when you will arrive there with me."

The conversation took place in a room in the Marquette Hotel tonight, where Schepps is being detained under a heavy guard, and Captain Howell, to a heavy guard, and Captain Howell, to whom the suggestion and offer was made, frowned down the offer, and assured the fugitive he would have to go back with New York officers, who are expected here tonight. The start for New York with Schepps will doubtless be made on the early train leaving here tomorrow morning here tomorrow morning.
