

GUN MEN'S ALLY RUN TO EARTH

Sam Schepps, Badly Wanted,
Rounded Up at Hot Springs,
Arkansas.

FEARS ASSASSINATION

Offers Police Officer Large Sum To
Bring Him Back to New York
Secretly.

Hot Springs, Ark., Aug. 11.—There are more than ten thousand police officers in New York City, and nine thousand of them would not hesitate to put me out of the way if they had half a chance," declared Sam Schepps, arrested in this city yesterday afternoon as the go-between in the New York police graft scandal, and who is alleged to have paid the murderers of the gambler Rosenthal their fee for committing the murder.

"I do not want to go back with those Burns detectives nor with Whitcomb's representatives. I will give you \$500, Captain Howell, if you will take me back right away, and not say anything to them when you will arrive there with me."

The conversation took place in a room in the Marquette Hotel, where Schepps is being detained under a heavy guard, and Captain Howell, whom the suggestion and offer was made, frowned down the offer and assured the fugitive he would have to go back with New York officers, who are expected here tonight. The start for New York with Schepps will doubtless be made on the early train leaving here tomorrow morning.

Has Not Confessed.

When taken into custody, Schepps was about to post a letter addressed indirectly to "Jack Rose," in which he said he would change his address immediately, and unless he would from Rose on certain details he would not be heard later if sent for.

A report tonight gained wide circulation that Schepps had made a full confession to his U. S. captors, but when asked if this report was true he denied it quite vigorously.

"I am not going to give out any more interviews," he declared, and that many reporters could get out of him.

A representative of District Attorney Whitman, as well as a couple of Burns detectives, are expected to arrive in the city on a late train tonight, and Schepps will be rushed back to New York. He fears that he will be assassinated before reaching New York or shortly afterwards, hence his offer to pay Captain Howell to take him back secretly, believing he may reach safe quarters in New York that way without the police of that city learning of his arrival.

WOOD PULP AND PRINT PAVER GO IN DUTY FREE

No Tax by United States If Manufactured From B. C. Woods.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 10.—Wood pulp, print paper and paper board manufactured from woods of British Columbia from which the export restrictions were recently removed by the council of that province, will be admitted to the United States free of duty under the one operative clause of the Canadian reciprocity act.

Secretary of the Treasury MacVeagh made this decision today after an investigation of the subject by the state department. The woods affected are in certain leases controlled by the Powell River Company of British Columbia, lying west of the Cascade Range Mountains. The order is expected to increase the importation of free wood pulp and paper to the Pacific coast states, and will take effect as of July 12.

RUSH TO HEAR DARROW

Mexico City, Aug. 10.—The status of Emiliano Zapata, leader of the rebels in the south, is unchanged. The Government has not yet received word from Zapata that he has returned to Mexico, but reports of his return are being received from the south. TURKS BUTCHERED FOR THREE HOURS

First Details of the Dreadful Massacre of Innocent Bulgarians.

OFFICERS LOOKED ON

One Hundred and Fifty Christians Cut to Pieces Following Bomb Explosion.

Saibury, Eng., Aug. 10.—In the details of the massacre of Bulgarians by Muslims on Aug. 2 at Kotscha-bu, 50 miles to the southwest of Thessalonica, the Turkish authorities show that the butchery lasted three hours, in which over 140 Bulgarians were cut to pieces.

The trouble began with the explosion of a bomb on the market square, when it was crowded with people. Five Bulgarians and six other persons were killed. Five minutes later a second bomb exploded in the same place, causing further deaths.

Soon afterwards some bands of Muslims appeared on the street armed with guns, revolvers, knives and clubs, with which they carried out a wholesale butchery of Bulgarians, lasting three hours, while the Turkish officials were looking on.

Later on Turkish troops arrived, but military aeroplanes were officially credited with 74.6 miles an hour, the Harriet monoplane with 68.1 miles an hour, and the Blériot monoplane with 61.1 miles.

REMARKABLE TRAIN.

Montreal, Aug. 10.—One of the most remarkable trains that has been seen in the Windsor station in a long time, pulled in last night in a hurried manner, after having made the run from Quebec to Montreal in a trifle over four hours.

There were on the train two carloads of mail, one for Toronto, one for China, one carload for Winnipeg, making Montreal and four other shipments, the one of the heaviest mail shipments the city has ever received.

The train was carried for some time, while the train was going through in time, which almost equals that made by the famous Overland Limited of past years. Four passengers for the Orient also travelled on the train.

The building was a residence built by the order of Mr. E. T. Malone, of Toronto, and its balcony frame transgressed the city by-law for fire limit. Having no building permit by which to keep track of plans of new erections, the fire authorities here let the building go on some time before discovering that the plans were unsuitable.

FIGHTING RENEWED.

Cottinje, Aug. 11.—Fighting has been renewed on the Turkish frontier. The Turks have been reinforced. There is much excitement here.

INCREASED PASTOR'S SALARY.

St. Thomas, Aug. 11.—The official board of the First Methodist Church has increased the salary of Rev. Dr. Douglass from \$1,500 to \$1,700 a year.

PAINFULLY INJURED.

St. Thomas, Aug. 11.—Mr. Arthur Down, wife of a farmer residing near Down, was badly injured while standing near a binder. The team started and the knives struck her on the legs, lacerating them seriously.

THOUSANDS KILLED AND INJURED BY AN EARTHQUAKE IN TURKEY

Many Towns Wiped Out Through Fires Started by a Seismic Shock Along Shores of the Dardanelles and Sea of Marmora—Relief Being Rushed to Scene.

Constantinople, Aug. 11.—Reports here today indicate that the great earthquake which was felt through a great part of Turkey was accompanied by much heavier loss of life than at first stated. The newspapers today estimate the number of victims at 2,000, said to number from 5,000 to 6,000. The details of the earthquake, which are coming in slowly, indicate that the earthquake was widespread, and that the seismic disturbance was widespread. Several hundred persons are reported to have been killed, thousands are reported to have been injured, and outbreaks of fire have occurred in many of the towns and villages. Great destruction has been caused by the upheaval.

The entire district between Constantinople and Adrianople felt the shock severely. Fugitives from Myrphito report 300 killed and 500 injured. This town has been burning since they left. Many have been killed and wounded. The wrecked buildings are many.

ROUGH RIDER'S MEN BOLTED IN OHIO STATE

THREE ALDERMEN HAVE CONFESSED

Detroit City Fathers, Under Arrest, Tell All to Prosecuting Attorney.

MORE ARRESTS LIKELY

Sensational Developments Promised in Aldermanic Graft Scandal at City of the Straits.

Detroit, Aug. 11.—It was admitted today that Prosecuting Attorney Hugh Sheppard has in his possession the confessions of three of the eighteen city officials now under arrest in connection with the graft scandal. Two of the confessions are said to have been made by aldermen, and the third by a city official. The confessions are said to be of great importance, and are expected to lead to more arrests.

DR. MEAGHER DEAD

Montreal Physician Taken While on a Visit to Kingston.

Kingston, Aug. 11.—Dr. Daniel Meagher, of Montreal, was found dead at the home of Charles Brophy, Wellington street, on Saturday afternoon. Dr. Meagher had been spending the week with Mr. Brophy at Long Island Park, and as he was in the city Friday night alone. On Saturday afternoon Mr. Brophy called at the house and was startled to find Dr. Meagher dead on the stairway.

Dr. A. E. Ross, coroner, found death had been due to natural causes and an inquest unnecessary. He had been complaining of pains in his head, and it is supposed he had been suffering from a stroke. He was about 65 years of age, and had been a resident of this city for many years. For several years he had been practicing medicine in this city, later moving to Montreal. He was unmarried.
