

LONDON BOY SHOWS UP PROMINENTLY IN GREAT WAR PICTURE

FRIEND IDENTIFIES HIM

At least one London soldier stands out prominently in the "Battle of the Somme" moving pictures as to be quickly identified by his friends, and his relatives here will be among the most eager of the thousands who will witness the presentation of the British official fighting film under the auspices of The Advertiser at the Lyric Theatre all next week.

C. Jacques of 422 York street, has just received a letter from England in which reference is made to the presence in the picture of Pte. A. L. Jacques, who left London in December, 1914, with the Army Service Corps. Pte. Jacques has been in the thick of the war ever since, and, needless to say, has rendered valiant service in his two years of service. The letter from England says:

Taking Up Shells. "I must tell you we had the pictures of 'The Battle of the Somme' at the theatre here, and he was driving a motor wagon full of shells up to the firing line. Then the soldiers stood in a row and passed them along a line, and Archie was the third one. He had his own coat, the only soldier with an overcoat on."

For while the pictures were taken before the Canadians went to the Somme, it is quite possible that Canadian transport was brought into service. All of the soldiers training in the city will attend and many of them will go in bodies. It is expected that many of these groups will attend on Monday and Tuesday because of the better chance to secure accommodation. SAYS MAJ. NELLES ONE OF BEST AND BRAVEST SOLDIERS

Returned Man Speaks Highly of London Officer.

SIX BACK FROM FRONT

Nearly All Bear Wounds as Mementos of Their Service.

Six invalided soldiers returned to London today from England, and were given a hearty reception by the soldiers' aid commission. Arthur H. Keene and a deputation from the association met them, and escorted them to the Teemish House in automobiles loaned by the British Empire League. The Scottish Pipe Band of the A. M. C. headed the procession.

There was one Londoner in the party. Pte. H. Taylor of the 16th Battalion. He thought his folks lived on Simcoe street, but he was not aware. "You know, they move some times," he said.

Call Him a Wonder. He went forward with the detached company of the 33rd Battalion, under Capt. Maj. Harry Nelles. He was wounded at Ypres, and was sent home. He was the Vancouver Highlander in action.

"Capt. Nelles is one of the best, and bravest soldiers I have ever seen," said Pte. Taylor. "He is a wonder, the only I left him in France early in the summer. He's worth while."

Pte. R. Jackson, Konoia, went to the front with the same detachment, and was with the 16th Battalion in the first Somme drive, and was shot.

They Carry Souvenirs. Pte. P. Beaumont, Kingsville, joined the 33rd, and went to Ypres with the 16th Battalion. He is suffering from shell shock, souvenirs of Ypres and the Somme.

It will point out that the council has posted a notice that any person using the thoroughfare must do so at his own risk, and thus relieve the municipality of all responsibility for accidents, the chief concern of the aldermen so far as this question is concerned.

The revised official figures of Building Inspector Piper show that the total for the month of October was \$110,145, as compared with \$110,980 for the same period last year. Late yesterday afternoon, a number of permits were issued, increasing the total. They were to M. J. Flood for two one-story frame houses on Kenyon Road, costing \$1,600, and to M. Steele for a garage on Dundas street, costing \$1,600.

CALIFORNIA TO USE AUSTRALIAN WHEAT

Ship Chartered to Bring Cereal From Antipodes.

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 1.—To take advantage of the high price of wheat in the United States, Balfour Guthrie & Co. announce that they intend to ship large quantities of the cereal from Australia, where it is said this year's crops have been unusually heavy.

The announcement was made following the report that the four-masted schooner Snow and Burgess had been chartered by a San Francisco firm to bring a cargo of wheat from Melbourne to San Francisco. It is said, will be the first wheat cargo to be sent from Australia to California.

Many Municipalities Have Not Yet Made Known Their Intentions.

B. J. Roberts, secretary of the organization of resources committee, sends out information on the British Red Cross campaign in Ontario. The province of Ontario's response to the appeal of the British Red Cross has resulted in the subscription of \$1,400,000 up to date, with a large number of municipalities yet to report. In addition to these amounts it is expected that the municipalities yet to report will give generous contributions, and that the amounts given by the places above mentioned will be supplemented by further contributions from individuals, schools, Red Cross, and other patriotic committees.

NEW REGULATIONS FOR EDUCATION TO HELP IN RECRUITING

Pamphlet Issued by Department at Ottawa.

SOME EXEMPTIONS GIVEN

Minister Praises Teachers for Teaching About War and Working.

A pamphlet dealing with special regulations for the schools, for the school year of 1916-17, necessitated by war conditions, has been recently issued by the Ontario department of education. These regulations concern departmental and the university matriculation courses and examinations in history and geography; enlistment for overseas service; and thirdly, employment on Ontario farms.

The minister of education acknowledges with pleasure the zeal with which the new regulations have been accepted by the teachers, who, in the schools, have taught the war, and outside, organized and collected patriotic and Red Cross funds. They have further assisted recruiting sergeants and in large numbers volunteered for service.

To assist the teachers, the minister of education has prepared an outline of suggestions for study. These include a brief study of the geographical background of the war, a brief study of the cause of the war, a study of the method of conducting the war, events in the war on each front, overseas dominions and the war.

The minister now directs that an adequate knowledge of such topics from the history of the war as may be suitable for study in each school grade be retained as one of the tests for promotion. At the departmental examinations of 1917, except in the paper on ancient history, at least one question on the war will be asked in each examination paper in history. The geography papers will also contain questions on places made especially significant by the war.

Certain non-union members have been made by the department of education to the regulations of January and March 1916 which provided for the enlistment of young men attending high and continuing schools or collegiate institutions, in preparation for examinations the following June. Candidates attending the first term of this year high and continuing schools or collegiate institutions in preparation for examinations in June 1917, and who enlist for overseas service in the present war, will, on application to the minister of education, after the completion of their war service, be admitted to not more than two summer school sessions for said examinations, with exemption of fees and with allowance for travelling expenses to and from their ordinary places of abode.

With the application to the minister of education the will and candidates will be obliged to submit a certificate of honorable discharge from the department of militia and defence, Ottawa.

Some Exemptions. On certain conditions, the minister of education after next Easter will grant candidates now attending high and continuing schools or collegiate institutions in preparation for examinations in June for admission to normal schools and the faculties of education, exemption from said examinations with certificates conferred.

An important consideration will be the statement that in the judgment of teachers concerned in preparing him for his examination, the pupil is qualified to receive his certificate.

Amending the regulations of March 1916 in regard to the employment of students on Ontario farms for planting, cultivating and harvesting crops, an important change has been made. The value of the service which girls may render as well as boys is now recognized. On certain conditions, pupils culled in the bulletin, high school entrance boards may exempt from examination and may grant certificates to girls.

FIRE IN THE BUNKERS FILLED AT NEW YORK

Chicago's Captain Tells of Exciting Incident of Voyage.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Nov. 1.—A dispatch to the Herald from Horta, Fayal, dated yesterday, says:

"The steamer Chicago, which put back to the Azores because of a fire in her coal bunkers, Captain Mace, said:

"The blaze began at twenty-five minutes before three in the morning in a heavy sea, and was extinguished immediately after our arrival at Fayal. The damage to the cargo is now estimated at 300,000 francs (\$60,000). The damage to luggage is not yet known. The fire originated in the coal bunkers, which were filled in New York.

"The passengers behaved splendidly. There was no panic and all enjoyed their enforced stay at the Azores where they received great attention and especially courtesy of the consuls.

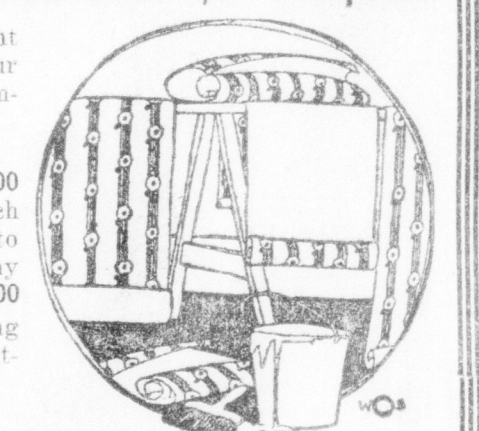
"The vitals of the ship were untouched, according to a survey held, and the damaged coal is being discharged and replaced by fresh and the bunkers overhauled."
