



### G. T. R. MUST CONCEDE LAND IN EXCHANGE OR GET NO DEEDS

Closing of Wilton Grove Depends On Reciprocation by Company.

RECLAMATION YARD

City Wants Land in Exchange For Rights Granted.

Although officials of the Grand Trunk Railway have written to the city clerk, from Montreal, asking for deeds to property closing Wilton avenue for its reclamation yard. City Engineer Brazier stated this morning that these will not be forthcoming until the railway comny agrees to tender land in exchange that obtained by closing the thor-

pany agrees to tender land in exchange for that obtained by closing the thoroughfare.

The railway wishes that property comprising Wilton avenue from the east side of Egerton street, to the west side of Childers street. The city desires that the company deed the land required for the extension of Childers street between the present north limit and Wilton avenue in exchange. In addition a portion of this property is to be utilized to extend Eleanor street south.

The company has declined to accept these conditions on the grounds that no level crossing is desired at Eleanor street. However, the city enginer, while willing to waive construction of this level crossing at present, desires 66 feet of railway property to be used to open up Eleanor street further south in future, if such is desired.

The city engineer announced today that he is working on the matter, and that until further negotiations can be opened with the Grand Trunk officials to exchange the lots, no deeds will be forwarded to Montreal. He will report any progress made at the next meeting of No. 2 committee of the city council.
