West York Physician Attacks Legality of Prescription Ban

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 19.—Dr. Forbes Godfrey, M.L.A., West York. this afternoon issued a writ against J. Hales, W. S. Dingman and G. T. Smith, board of license commissioners for Ontario, asking for the suspension of the order by which the commission prohibited him from issuing prescriptions for liquor as a qualified medical practitioner, when necessary for the health of his patients, or in case of actual need, or when in his judgment the use of liquor is necessary in the course of his professional practice.

Dr. Godfrey also asks for a declaration that the alleged suspension is invalid and unauthorized, and for a declaration that the commission had no power to limit the prescriptions to be issued, and that section 51 C of the Ontario temperance act is unauthorized and ultra vires.
