KING GETS BIG OVATION IN HIS ONTARIO RIDING

North York Electors Show Resentment At Nomination of Armstrong.

PREMIER ALONE OPPOSED

All Other Members of Liberal Cabinet Are Returned by Acclamation.

NEWMARKET, Ont., Jan. 19.—There was no abatement of Liberal enthusiasm in North York today when the by-election campaign of Premier W. L. Mackenzie King and his opponent, Mr. J. A. M. Armstrong, opened here with a joint Liberal and Conservative rally following the nominations of the candidates.

The town hall was jammed in defiance of all fire regulations and a delirium of applause greeted the premier when he appeared on the platform.

At the last minute it was announced that Mr. Armstrong was ill and unable to speak.

The invitation of the chairman, Howard Kane, did not go unaccepted, however.

A deep and impressive voice spoke up from the rear of the platform. "I will speak for Mr. Armstrong," it was none other than Mr. Archie Drainin of Toronto.

Mr. Drainin made a good many votes for the premier of Canada this afternoon. He occupied the platform for fifteen minutes. His performance was a burlesque.

Drainin started well by peering under the table with the remark: "I see there's nothing there so I guess it's safe."

He followed this by announcing that Mr. Armstrong is running for one reason, and one only, "the Sutton liquor raid, engineered not by men like Mr. Kane here, but by some Grits, and certainly by Mr. Kane and his paid detectives."

He followed this by a few pleasantries regarding the harmless habit of indulging in an odd drink at times.

"Were you at Sutton?" asked a voice. "Yes," bawled Archie. "I was there and I had a drink."

Archie turned then to personalities and his accent began to give way under the strain. He described in detail Mr. Armstrong's virtues, proclaimed that he was "not afraid of a dozen Mackenzie Kings," and said that his hearers should vote for the Conservative party because it is the only patriotic party in Canada.

A Sad Mistake.

Then Archie made a sad mistake. He told the audience why they should not vote for the Liberals. "It is Quebec, and Quebec is the disloyal section of this country. They sent no men to the war, they—"

He got no further. A wild roar smothered him. A semicircle of ferocious gentlemen surrounded him from the rear. Flats were brandished menacingly, and things looked decidedly bad for Mr. Drainin.

"Take it back," roared a dozen—"kill him," from another dozen—"throw him out the window," from others.

Archie tried to smooth it over, but the crowd wanted blood. Finally he capitulated, apologized, and withdrew his remarks.

The remainder of the oration of Mr. Armstrong's representative did not matter much, because little of it could be heard.

One gathered between interruptions that Archie was expressing a desire to wafer large sums of money with one and all on some subject in which he manifested interest by brandishing a large roll of bills. Finally he saw it was useless, and made a discreet exit, with the pleasant information that he is to be here throughout the campaign and that he is "a Jew and proud of it."

"Now that the entertainment is over," said Chairman Howard Kane, "we can proceed to business," and in a very neat little speech introduced the premier.

Mr. King, who had been quietly smiling all through Drainin's efforts, was greeted with wild enthusiasm which prolonged into moments of steady cheering.

In Class by Himself.

The premier opened his address with an expression of his sincere and humble gratitude to North York for their verdict on Dec. 6. He referred laughingly to the present contest, and reading telegrams telling of the acclamations of all his cabinet ministers said that he is "evidently the only unworthy member of the cabinet."

Referring to former Premier Meighen's candidature in Grenville, the premier said that it was an example of Meighen's autocracy in choosing Grenville as close to Ottawa instead of following the path of democracy by waiting for the people to choose him. At the same time he had requested that there be no opposition to Mr. Meighen.

"As a matter of fact," said the premier with a smile, "I'll be very glad to see Mr. Meighen in the House of Commons. I want him as leader of the opposition because he is a typical Tory, and he serves admirably to show the distinction between the principles of Liberalism and Conservatism."

Premier King then turned to Mr. Armstrong's position in opposing his return to Ottawa. He dealt with it with good humor, without rancor and with sympathy.

He read Mr. Armstrong's recent statement of his motive in accepting nomination, pointing out that it contained no mention of national questions, but rested entirely on a personal matter of Mr. Armstrong's reputation.

"It is personal, not public, not local, not national," he said, "and interests Canada only in so far as it may hinder the speedy establishment of government and the expenditure of large sums of money in campaign arrangements."

"There is an old saying," he continued, "that the lady protesteth too much, and to my mind Mr. Armstrong is only doing himself harm by too much denial, especially if his friends permit the affair to go on to a verdict of the people against him by 4,000 or 5,000 majority. If Mr. Armstrong has a grievance the courts of Canada provide a remedy, and it is to them that he should appeal. I have had a good many things said against myself, even this afternoon, but I know what I have done,

and I am not afraid of my friends interpreting wrongly.

"Mr. Armstrong should have confidence in his past record. He asks for British fairplay. I believe that that includes sportsmanship as a good loser."

The premier turned to the future, stating his intention of observing the democratic instincts of the Canadian people, and acting on the principles he had proclaimed during the campaign.

"He told the words in which the governor-general had asked him to become premier. They were: 'Mr. King, you are the elect of the people, are you ready to take over the government?'"

"Those are remarkable words," commented the premier. "They express the democratic foundation of our government."

Mr. King explained his attitude in selecting a cabinet. "The sentiment of the country was plain," he said. "When I approached the Progressive element it was not with any idea of amalgamation or compromise. It was that the sentiment of the people might be fully represented if it were desired."

MURDOCK WINS SEAT.

CHATHAM, Jan. 19.—Hon. James Murdock, minister of labor, was elected as representative for Kent in the House of Commons this afternoon by acclamation.

Before leaving for Wallaceburg, where a public reception for the minister will be held, Mr. Murdock dispatched the following telegram to Premier King: "As a result of the consideration given by our Conservative and Progressive friends to the verdict rendered by the Canadian people on Dec. 6 last, I have been elected by acclamation as member for the county of Kent. I am indeed glad to now be in a position to give you and the people of Kent and of Canada the best there is in me to carry on and to perform the duties before us. I trust the people of North York will also concede your election by acclamation."

In an interview Mr. Murdock stated: "Words will not express my feelings at the kindness shown me by the electors of Kent, and particularly the Conservative and Progressive parties. I appreciate the courtesy. It is a great encouragement to me. I will be able to return to my duties almost immediately. I trust that the electors of Kent will never have cause to regret the confidence they have placed in me."

W. C. KENNEDY UNOPOSED.
WINDSOR, Jan. 19.—As was expected, Hon. W. C. Kennedy, minister of railways and canals in the King cabinet, was the only one nominated for the by-election in North Essex, and he thus returned to his cabinet seat by acclamation.

MOTHERWELL GETS SEAT.
REGINA, Jan. 19.—Hon. W. R. Motherwell, minister of agriculture, was returned by acclamation for the Regina seat.

KING TO JOIN CABINET.
VANCOUVER, Jan. 19.—Hon. J. H. King, provincial minister of public works, who is here today from Victoria, announced that he is leaving for Ottawa within the next three days to be sworn in as minister of public works for the Dominion.

McKENZIE RE-ELECTED.
SYDNEY, N. S., Jan. 19.—Hon. D. McKenzie, solicitor-general, was declared elected by acclamation for the constituency of Cape Breton North and Victoria this afternoon at the close of the by-election nomination proceedings made necessary by his appointment to the Dominion cabinet.

ROBB GETS ACCLAMATION.
HUNTINGDON, Que., Jan. 19.—Hon. James A. Robb, minister of trade and commerce, offering for re-election following his acceptance of a portfolio in the cabinet of Premier King, was returned by acclamation this afternoon.

CRERAR REMAINS IN WEST.
WINNIPEG, Jan. 19.—Hon. T. A. Crerar, leader of the National Progressive party, stated today he would not go East to take part in the by-election in Grenville, Ont., where the Progressive candidate, A. K. Patterson, is opposing Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen.

B. C. MEMBER RESIGNS.
CRANBROOK, B. C., Jan. 19.—R. E. Beattie, M.P. elect for East Kootenay, has resigned. His resignation was received at a meeting of the executive of the Liberal Association here last night, and was accepted. This will necessitate another federal by-election.

The Liberals of the riding will probably hold a nomination convention, when, it is intimated, Hon. J. H. King, minister of public works in British Columbia, recently named for the federal portfolio of public works, will be offered the nomination.

It was stated at a recent meeting of the Conservative executive it was decided, in the event of Dr. King's election, to offer him the nomination.

West York Physician Attacks Legality of Prescription Ban

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 19.—Dr. Forbes Godfrey, M.L.A., West York, this afternoon issued a writ against J. Hales, W. S. Dingman and G. T. Smith, board of license commissioners for Ontario, asking for the suspension of the order by which the commission prohibited him from issuing prescriptions for liquor as a qualified medical practitioner, when necessary for the health of his patients, or in case of actual need, or when in his judgment the use of liquor is necessary in the course of his professional practice.

Dr. Godfrey also asks for a declaration that the alleged suspension is invalid and unauthorized, and for a declaration that the commission had no power to limit the prescriptions to be issued, and that section 51 C of the Ontario Temperance act is unauthorized and ultra vires.
