## CITY TO ASSESS WHITE'S HIGHER

Revision Court Decides Company To Pay On Full Valuation of Property.

#### Explain Charge On Thistle Rink Due to Misunderstanding.

Ruling that George White & Sons have enjoyed a fixed assessment on their factory and land in East Lon don for ten years, as stipulated by the legislature, the court of revision in session Monday afternoon decided that this firm shall be assessed this year for full valuation of property and buildings upon which taxes will be paid in 1923.

George White & Sons appealed for a fixed assessment this year, on the grounds that when the legislature passed the bill allowing them fixed assessment in 1913, the bill stipulated that the fixed sum should not be exceeded for ten years thereafter, and therefore the 1922 assessment for 1923 taxes should be fixed. Bill Passed in 1913.

However, City Clerk S. Baker ex-plained to the court that when the bill passed in 1913 the assessment was put into force that year, and therefore not including the 1922 as-sessment the firm has enjoyed ten vears' taxation on \$25,000 only

City Clerk Baker characterized the appeal as a vexing problem, and declared that the solution rests on the legal interpretation of the bill passed Toronto. He asserted that George White & Sons have received all they were entitled to, and


