FAMILY PACKS BALE OF LATE MRS. REASON

Annual Shipment To Labrador
Does Not Cease With
Donor's Death.

For many years past, Mrs. Catharine Reason had been sending a generous bale to the Grenfell Mission, Labrador. But since the packing of the 1922 bale in June last year, death has called the kind benefactress of these people to the far north. Her death in January last, however, has not caused the bale to cease. By her personal efforts, even during the last days of her life, Mrs. Reason contrived to make a large quantity of clothing, and collected many articles, which were destined for the bale this year. And it will be shipped to Labrador within a few days. The Harrington Hospital, to which this bale is going, is the farthest north hospital in Labrador.

The formal packing of the bale took place yesterday afternoon at the home of Dr. Clifford Reason, Elias street, a son of the late Mrs. Reason. Officiating at the packing were her two daughters, Mrs. L. B. Charlton and Mrs. H. Knight, and two friends of the late Mrs. Reason, Mrs. Chambers and Mrs. Marion Kerr.

This bale, the new contents of which are valued at over \$120, not to mention many partially used articles, includes 1 dozen bird whistles, cocoa, two neckties, 1 pair of woolen gloves, 2 pairs of woolen stockings, 6 woolen caps, 12 hospital nightgowns, 1 pound tin cup and saucer, 1 apron, 1 doz. soap, talcum powder, 2 nightgowns, 2 pairs cashmere stockings, package of cornstarch, 1 doll and bath, string beads, 2 pairs socks, 5 baby's bonnet, 1 head saw, 8 children's bonnets, 12 lead shawls, 12 dresses, 6 pairs of mitts, 8 games of dominoes, soap, 2 dozen spoons thread, marbles, ball, candy, pins, buttons, 8 large quilts, 12 bonnets, 1 dozen gowns.
