CIVIC GOLF COURSE CANVASS TO START IN NEXT FEW DAYS

More Than 120 Citizens Have Signed Membership Application.

SURVEY TO BE MADE

Immediate steps will be taken to canvass prospective members of London's civic golf course, E. V. Buchanan, manager of the public utilities, announced at a meeting of that body yesterday afternoon. The 120 citizens who have already signed applications to join will comprise the nucleus of the organization, Mr. Buchanan said.

Jared Vining, chairman of the public utilities commission, was confident that the civic golf course would prove a success, and predicted a membership of 600 within a relatively short period. He believed the revenue procured from membership fees would not only carry the club for the first year, but also enable it to add another nine holes during the second season.

Mr. Buchanan stated F. W. Farrcomb had volunteered to survey the land chosen for the golf links free of charge. This was a substantial item overcome, the general manager stated, adding that a membership campaign would commence at once with the assistance of those who have already signified a desire to join.

Although under supervision of the public utilities, no public money would be spent on the course. The upkeep and construction was to be met from fees and subscriptions, Mr. Buchanan explained.

All members of the commission believed the proposed course worthy of much benefit to citizens, and an attraction for tourists from early spring to late autumn.

In Canada's Parliament

Ottawa, April 4.—Today in parliament:

Resolutions providing for branch line construction will be considered in the House of Commons.

Senate sits at 3 p.m.

Yesterday in parliament:

Senator Turfitt proposed in the Senate that the membership of the Senate be reduced and that members be retired at the age of 75. The debate was unfinished.

Senate departed from custom and

debated estimates before adopting interim supply bill.

Senator Bennett criticized government expenditures for furniture and auto-up-keep, suggested reduction in sessional indemnities and in salaries of judges.

In the Commons, six bills for branch lines reached first reading, making seven out of twenty-six resolutions to pass the house. Expenditures of \$6,422,300 have been approved out of more than \$28,000,000 involved in the government program.

G. A. Wenige, "the man who made walking expensive," has arranged a display of wheels that will prove interesting to parents and children.

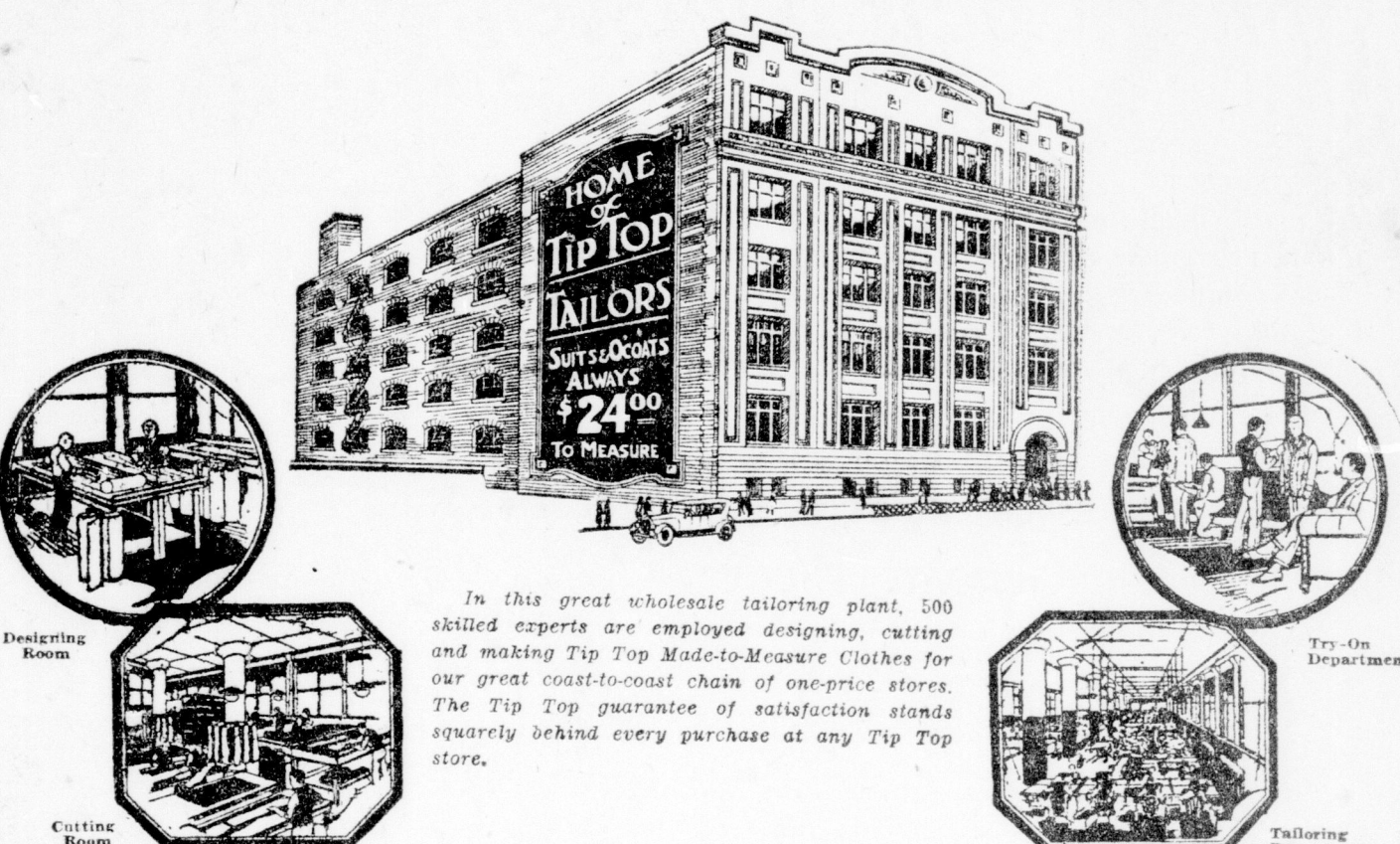
WARNS COMPANION, THEN KILLED BY DIRT CAVE-IN

Norwich, Conn., April 4.—Adolph Senay, 55, was killed yesterday when he was buried alive in a ditch he was digging for a water pipe at Baltic, six miles from here. Senay saved the life of a fellow-worker by shouting to him as he saw the dirt begin to cave, but he himself was unable to get out and was buried under nine feet of earth. When dug out he was dead with a crushed skull. The other man was buried to his waist, but was able to squirm out and help dig to where Senay's body was found.

The dead man was married. He leaves a brother in Canada.

CONFIDENCE VOTED IN FRENCH CABINET

Poincare's Policy of Reparations Security and Economy To Be Continued.

Paris, April 3.—Once again Premier Poincare has had to use forceful measures in the Chamber of Deputies in order to obtain decisive action.

The obstructive tactics of the opposition today impelled the premier to threaten the resignation of the entire cabinet unless the discussion of the government's foreign policy was completed and a vote taken.

Meanwhile the chamber adjourned for an hour, and after the debate had dragged on for an hour and a half, in resumption of the session, the house by a majority of 257 expressed confidence in the government to carry on the "policy of reparations, security and economy demanded by the country." The vote was 408 to 15.

Throughout the session the opposition continued to attack the premier, though no hope was entertained of defeating or even making a strong showing against the new cabinet. The object appeared to put before the voters of the country the arguments the different parties will invoke at the next legislative elections, May 11.

M. Herriot, leader of the radical party, anticipating the report of the experts on Germany's ability to pay reparations, declared:

"If the experts' report is accepted it will be necessary to maintain French troops in the Ruhr for fifty years."

A member of the right party shouted: "We will have war with Germany inside of fifty years."

Resuming his remarks, M. Herriot said: "France will never obtain reparations and security unless control by all the Allies is substituted in the Ruhr for the present French control."

M. Poincare assured the chamber that France would remain in the Ruhr until the payment of reparations was completed. He promised the chamber that the government would not accept any suggestion of a reduction in the German debt.

M'LACHLAN ASSAILS GOVERNMENT METHODS

The Deposed Mine Secretary Denounces Inspectors As a Farce.

New Glasgow, N. S., April 4.—J. B. McLachlan, deposed secretary, District 26, United Mine Workers of America, addressed a largely attended public meeting here last night.

He discussed the Montreal miners' wage agreement, and said that the Nova Scotia miners were "betrayed" by President Lewis and lied to by him.

He said 32 miners were killed in Nova Scotia last year, and blamed the provincial government for the fatalities, stating that the inspection of mines was a farce. He said the kind of peace the company and the government want is cheap human flesh.

CAPT. BAKER TO TELL OF WORK AMONG BLIND

To Give Address, April 11, Before Municipal Chapter and Citizenship Committee.

Capt. Baker of the Canadian Institute for the Blind will be an interesting visitor in the city next week, giving a public address on the work of that Institute throughout Canada.

The address will be given at the Smallman & Ingram tea room on Friday afternoon, April 11, under the combined auspices of the Municipal Chapter, I. O. O. F., and the citizenship committee of the Local Council of Women. Captain Baker will tell how hundreds of blind people throughout the Dominion are made self-supporting or partly self-supporting through the efforts of this organization. It is the duty of their instructors to go into the homes of the blind and show them how to occupy their time in a remunerative way.

This address will probably be the initial move in a campaign for funds to be held later in the season. Mrs. E. B. Smith is convener of the local committee in aid of the blind.

150 NURSES ON BOOKS OF CENTRAL REGISTRY

Miss Jessie Mortimore Reports That All Are Very Busy Just Now.

The names of over 150 nurses are now on the books at the Central Nurses' Registry, located at 489 Dufferin avenue. Although this institution was started in London but a few months ago by the united efforts of the Victoria and St. Joseph's Alumnae and those nurses who now form the Edith Cavell Chapter of the Graduate Nurses' Association, it is doing an important work for the nursing profession of the city, as well as for the citizens of London, who are now able to locate a nurse immediately.

Miss Jessie Mortimore, the registrar, reports that at the present time all the nurses in the city are very busy. Not only are there graduate nurses registered with her, but a few practical nurses as well.

NEGRO BOY LYNCHED AFTER WOUNDING CHIEF OF POLICE

Woodbury, Ga., April 4.—Beach Thrash, fifteen-year-old negro boy, was taken from the city jail here yesterday and lynched by a mob after he had shot and perhaps fatally wounded Chief of Police Albert Wells, who had arrested him for stealing money from a local bank.
