Strathroy Rejoices at Semi-Official Announcement of Change in Sarnia Road.

NO CONFIRMATION

Department Official Declares Sarnia Gravel Will Be Route Selected.

Special to The Advertiser. Strathroy, July 25 .- A semi-official rumor reached Strathroy this morning from Toronto to the effect that the proposed provincial highway from Sarnia to London will take in Watford and Strathroy, southeast to Mount Brydges, east along the 3rd concession of Caradoc to Kilworth, Byron and Springbank Drive to London. This, it is claimed, has been practically settled by the department of highways.

Reeve Pike and citizens in general have fought hard for Strathroy to be placed on the new highway, and the news was received here with a great deal of pleasure.

No confirmation of the above report could be secured from the highway department at Toronto this morning. Mr. Coburn, a member of the staff, stated that the designation of highway had not been settled yet, and that any announcement from Strathroy was premature.

"As a matter of fact, when the highway is built, it will be built on the present Sarnia gravel road," said Mr. Coburn. "It is the logical road, in my oninion. It is not likely that there will be any construction though for some time to come. It is a dream of
