Attitude of Authorities Satisfactory to the United States.

Plans of Battleship Squadron Outlined by Admiral Barker.

Paris, June 11.—Information has been received from Lisbon concerning the plans of the American battleship squadron. Admiral Barker expects to leave Lisbon June 15 for Gibraltar, where the squadron will remain until the Morocco incident is settled. On the arrival there the Illinois and Missouri of the most modern battleships and six of the most modern cruisers and gunboats will be sent to Tangier. Barker does not expect that any serious incident will arise from the presence of the battleship force in the Mediterranean. The present force there is considered sufficient to impress the Moroccan government with the necessity for security. MUST SERVE SENTENCE.

St. Louis Rebers Must Go to the Penitentiary. Jefferson City, Mo., June 15.—The Supreme court affirmed the judgment of the St. Louis court against Julius Lehman and Emil Hartman, found guilty of bribery while members of the St. Louis house of delegates. Lehman was given seven years and Hartman six years in the penitentiary. The Supreme court sentenced Lehman to five years in the penitentiary.

SIX HUNDRED PERISH BY FIRE AND WATER

The Fearful Ending of a Sunday Sea Excursion on Long Island Sound—Steamer Caught in a Fire and Burned to the Waters Edge.

New York, June 15.—The magnificent day-excursion steamer Steamboat Company, was burned to the water's edge off North Brother island, East river, at the entrance to Long Island sound, today, resulting in the death of about 600 persons, mostly women and children. Four hundred and ninety-five bodies had been recovered today and divers were at work taking bodies from the hold of the steamer. The remains of many persons who leaped into the river have not yet been found, and it will be many hours before the last of the dead is recovered. The steamer was given seven years and Hartman six years in the penitentiary. The Supreme court sentenced Lehman to five years in the penitentiary.

RAISULTI'S STIPULATIONS.

Representatives of the Dominion and Allan lines and of the Canadian Pacific were also present. The White Star line's offer of a 50-shilling rate for third class fares to Quebec and Montreal.

CONFESSES OLD CRIME.

Murderer Surrenders to Free Man Servant Life Sentence. Kansas City, June 15.—William Miller, aged 60 years, appeared at the police station here yesterday and surrendered, saying he had killed John Edwards, a blacksmith, in 1902. Miller was sentenced to life imprisonment for the crime and a new retrial of the case in the Montana penitentiary. Miller was in the West since he wants to ease his conscience. According to his story, he shot Edwards in a quarrel over money.

Twelve Miles To Port Arthur

Russian Merchant States That Japanese Have penetrated Russian Lines.

Stoesse's Casualties Reported at Over Three Hundred on Tuesday.

Attack Was Renewed Yesterday And Rumor That It Was Repulsed.

London, June 15.—The correspondent of the Central News at Port Arthur reports that the Japanese are fighting at Vrangon, about 12 miles north of Port Arthur. It was renewed today and it is still proceeding. No details are obtainable as to the Japanese. It is rumored that the Japanese were successful in destroying three squadrons of Russian warships. The Russian casualties in the fighting yesterday were 308 men killed or wounded. The Japanese loss is not known.
