DECEIVING PUBLIC

Secretary of Board of Health Makes Statement Regarding Mr. Shaw And His "Pasteur- ized Milk"

Having read the recently published letter from W. S. Shaw, a local dairy man, dealing with the controversy between the Board of Health and him, Secretary McDonald, Secretary of the Board here yesterday made a statement to the Graphic which appears to throw more light on the subject and also to give it a somewhat different aspect. The gist of Mr. McDonald's statement follows:—

When it was decided recently by the Red Cross to secure pasteurized milk for babies in Campbellton, arrangements were made with Gray's Wholesale to pasteurize the milk. Mr. Shaw agreed to take the milk there for pasteurization, and the milk was purified there. Public Health Commissioner

Shaw and told him that he was deliberately deceiving the public. The secretary further stated that Shaw is not equipped to pasteurize milk.

In regard to Mr. Shaw's wax insinuations in his letter concerning the sanitary conditions of the milk dealers, Mr. McDonald declared that this was all "bunk."
